2025 PRESIDENTS REPORT

President

What a good time of year to be President. The Board and I have been looking back and celebrating so many amazing catches and achievements

throughout New Zealand as we make tough decisions on who secures our Council annual awards. This really hits home for me the commitment, professionalism and endurance required to secure these remarkable catches.

Hearty congratulations to all of you who made the short lists and the thousands of you who put in the time and effort to catch the whopper or simply help the next generation to learn the craft. Congratulations to Brock Johnson for being appointed an IGFA representative for NZ at 17 years old! As incredible as his fishing achievements in the last few years. This a testament to his mentors at the Counties Sport Fishing Club who I am sure are very proud.

I am confident that you agree, bringing home a reasonable catch to feed your family and share with friends is an intrinsic link to your cultural identity. It's what makes us Kiwi. Yet year after year we have to deal with indifferent officials defending the indefensible – over allocated

fisheries, the ongoing use of indiscriminate and destructive mobile bottom contact fishing methods and the constant threat of being forced into the dysfunctional and failing Quota Management System as a minor shareholder with some sort of quota allocation scheme – remember, 'The price of freedom is eternal vigilance.'

The post-election MMP coalition negotiation process has been particularly harsh as far as our precious marine environment is concerned. Here are the 21 words agreed upon in the Coalition Agreement between National and New Zealand First. ***'Deliver longer durations for marine farming permits and remove regulations that impede the productivity and enormous potential of the seafood sector.'***

On 6th August 2025, the Minister of Oceans and Fisheries released the plan for legislative amendment to give effect to this fishing industry wish list. We have asked for the Ministry Advice Paper and are now waiting, waiting, waiting. The OIA process being abused in my opinion. More gamesmanship, no goodwill. What is there to hide? Meanwhile I strongly recommend you carefully read our submission to the draft proposals to help understand how ridiculous and scary this is. Please be assured that we are maintaining a comprehensive record of this process.



A whopper thank you to your Standing Committees who are keeping the home fires burning on Fishing, Finance, Youth, Junior Youth, Communications, Disabilities, Fisheries Management, Governance Advisory, Complaints and Disputes, LegaSea Governance Advisory, and, more latterly, our efforts to establish the Hooked on Safety work stream and Standing Committee. 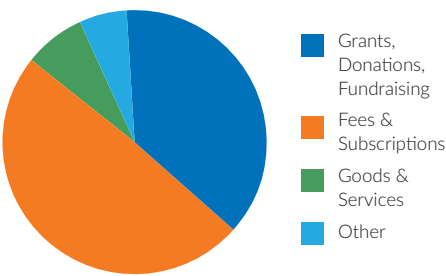

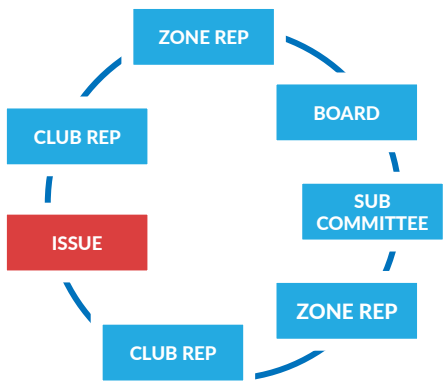
NZSFC FUNDING

- Goods and Services is AGM, tagging program revenue, Nationals revenue.

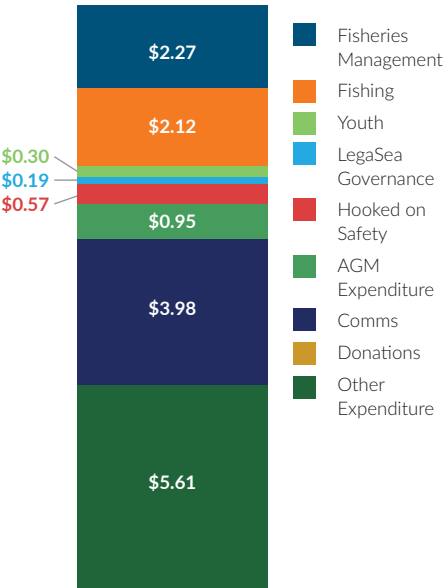
NZSFC CHAIN OF COMMUNICATION



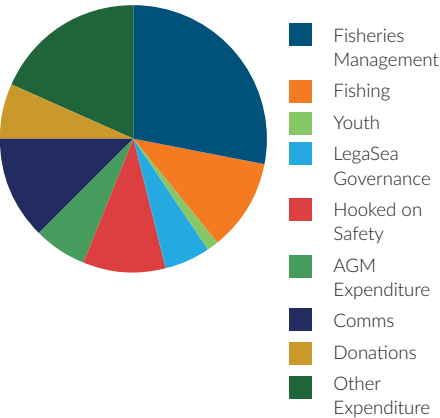

NZSFC SPEND

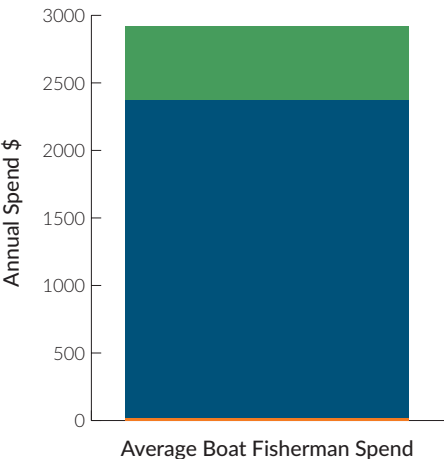
ALLOCATION OF \$16 P/A ADULT MEMBER FEES

FISHERIES MANAGEMENT REPORT

INTRODUCTION

As Co-chairs of the NZSFC Fisheries Management Standing Committee (FMSC) our focus is to uphold the Council's policy of restoring abundance in our coastal fisheries. Our dedicated Committee meets quarterly with our team of specialised contractors to discuss fisheries management matters across the country.

Advocating for abundance is never straightforward. In the past year we completed 22 submissions on a wide range of fisheries and RMA issues. Inadequate consultation timeframes continue to hinder our ability to develop responses. For example, in July 2025 we had 21 working days to submit responses for 35 fish stocks.

Through the ebbs and flows, it's been great to have a strong team to rely on. Wayne Bicknell has been an integral part of our Standing Committee for more than a decade. He is now stepping away from this role and we thank him for his service. We're sure LegaSea Hawkes Bay will welcome having him around more.

TEAM

We appreciate the ongoing commitment from all Standing Committee members including NZSFC Board members Peter Campbell, Andrew Johnson and Vance Fulton. Co-opted members include Richard Baker and Jim Yeoman (representing NZ Angling & Casting Association). Heyden Johnston and Dirk Sieling are regular attendees.

This year we welcomed Josh Barclay, representing New Zealand Underwater Association, and Mike Plant, NZSFC's operations and communications lead. We also acknowledge Scott Macindoe, who has stepped down from the Committee to take on the Presidency of NZSFC.

Special thanks to our team of specialist contractors who continue to support the NZSFC in many realms. We acknowledge Rowan Ashton and Stewart Ryan for their legal expertise. We are fortunate to retain ongoing support from John Holdsworth, Trish Rea, Barry Torkington, Sydney Curtis and Katie Goodwin. We also acknowledge Sam Woolford, Jessica Beetham and Benn Winlove for aligning the outreach work of LegaSea with the NZSFC.

Together with the New Zealand Angling & Casting Association and New Zealand Underwater Association, we are the largest and most relevant mandated groups representing recreational marine interests in Aotearoa.

HOLDING THE HARD LINE

This year reinforced why it's important to do what we do. We are currently facing a system that is geared towards permitting ongoing, excessive commercial catch limits that fail to constrain catch. The consequences have been dire, with an increasing number of areas closed to recreational fishing. And in the areas that are open to us, our bag limits are being slashed.

We are proud to be the voice of reason while engaging in more than 100 Ministry-led meetings of science working groups, fisheries planning, spatial plans and endless multi-stakeholder groups. Thank you to members of the FMSC and contractors who regularly attend these meetings who are safe in Council policies that seek more fish in the water and a vibrant marine environment.

Engaging with affiliated Clubs and their members throughout the year has been both valuable and grounding. These conversations highlight the impact of depletion of our coastal

fisheries, making it increasingly difficult for everyday Kiwi families to get out on the water, bring home a feed, or simply enjoy the experience of a thriving marine environment.

THE ROOT CAUSE

Much of the depletion we see in our coastal waters stems from ineffective management under the Quota Management System (QMS) that regulates commercial fishing. Officials continue to sanction the use of destructive fishing methods to the detriment of our coastal marine environment and fish.

With each passing year we continue to witness more closures and rāhui in response to depleted fisheries. Our scallop fishery has collapsed, and crayfish on the east coast could be next. This has all occurred under the QMS. It's clear that how we manage our fisheries, the status quo, is not working.

Instead of reform, we've witnessed a Minister who is hell-bent on entrenching the status quo. We encourage you to read the Fisheries Management Standing Committee report to learn more about what Shane Jones' recent 'reforms' mean for us and the health of our fisheries.

The key difference between recreational and commercial harvest is that the fish we catch while out on the water, feeds our friends and family. In contrast, around 90% of commercially harvested fish is exported overseas. And like many of our country's resources, overseas buyers often pay less for our kai moana than we do at the local fish shop. While the QMS exists, managers will continue to prioritise bulk harvesting rather than adding value to the harvest, while catching fewer fish.

RECREATIONAL HARVEST

The latest National Panel Survey results estimating recreational harvest in 2022-23 confirms that Kiwis take home less than 5% of the total harvest from New Zealand's marine waters to feed their families. There is some uncertainty about what is taken in some small-scale fisheries, so to be conservative we often refer to overall recreational harvest as being less than 10% of total harvest.

Despite these facts, cuts to recreational bag limits and allowances are often the first target when a fishery is showing signs of depletion. This protects quota from necessary reductions, and as long as the QMS is in place, this protection of private interests will continue.

LOOKING AHEAD

While the current government is in power until the end of 2026, we can continue to expect more challenging times, fast-tracking and the ongoing Ministerial led pressure to prioritise exports. Significant changes are also looming for crayfish on the North Island's east coast.

Our team will be on the frontline, submitting in response to proposals impacting the future management of crayfish as well as engaging with Zone 1, 2 and 5 clubs. We remain committed to advocating for restored crayfish abundance for the benefit of our future generations.

We are also expecting the Minister to develop a draft Bill filled with so-called 'reforms' to the Fisheries Act. (Read page 6 for more). If the Bill includes changes already signalled, the New Zealand Sport Fishing Council and LegaSea will fight tooth and nail to stop the Bill from becoming law.

LEGASEA REPORT

INTRODUCTION

LegaSea was established in 2012 by the New Zealand Sport Fishing Council (NZSFC), to elevate public awareness of issues impacting

our coastal fisheries, New Zealand's big blue playground.

LegaSea's mission is to communicate these challenges clearly to the public, and raise funds to support the vital work of the NZSFC Fisheries Management Standing Committee as they defend our collective interests in the marine environment. Our success is empowering everyday New Zealanders to make their voice heard.

Thirteen years on, LegaSea has grown exponentially as more Kiwis witness the decline of once-abundant coastal fish species and the degradation of our marine environment.

Our call to restore abundance and biodiversity for future generations remains more urgent than ever and it won't fade until we see meaningful reform of the failing Quota Management System.

EVENTS

Public outreach remains at the heart of our work. Throughout the year we engaged with thousands of Kiwis at events, thanks in large part to our dedicated volunteers.

1. In March, we launched the Fisheries Reform Scam campaign at the Auckland Boat Show thanks to our Gold Partner NZ Marine Industry. We were able to showcase our new Kai Ika ute thanks to Auckland City Toyota. Our friends at Wild Chix also joined us.
2. In May we returned to the Hutchwilco New Zealand Boat Show, one of the highlights of our calendar. Over four days, more than 4,400 people visited our stand, many already familiar with LegaSea's mission. By the end of the show,

our entire backdrop was covered in cardboard fish – each one representing a voice calling for restored abundance in our fisheries.

VOLUNTEER EFFORT

Time is one of the most valuable currencies. Every year we are amazed to see more people voluntarily dedicating their time to LegaSea, to help restore our marine environment. The commitment of these volunteers does not go unnoticed. In the past year volunteers have invested more than 400 hours in various initiatives including helping out at LegaSea HQ, assisting the team at events, and supporting the Westhaven Kai Ika station and kaimoana distributions.

ARTICLES

During the year we published more than 30 articles through local and national media outlets including NZ Fishing News, Fishing in Godzone, Dive Pacific, The Adventurer and Mahurangi Matters. This engagement is vital to raising public awareness and educating more Kiwis about issues impacting their local fisheries, while offering a solution or ways they can help.

ONLINE PRESENCE

The times are changing, and online digital content is king. Engagement across all of our LegaSea social media platforms has increased dramatically. Over the next 12 months we will continue to focus on improving this engagement and educating more Kiwis.

CAMPAIGNS

LegaSea remains fiercely committed to restoring our coastal fisheries and that means standing up to whatever nonsense comes our way. This year, we had to pivot fast to respond to Minister Shane Jones' proposed fisheries 'reforms' announced in February.

In response, we launched the Fisheries Reform Scam campaign to raise public awareness of the risks associated with the proposed changes. As part of our efforts we engaged with mainstream media outlets including Radio NZ, Newsroom and reporter Duncan Garner, making sure the public knew what was at stake.

Integral to the campaign was an online submission tool. We had to make it easy for concerned Kiwis to make their voice heard and write a submission. We received more than 25,000 submissions that were subsequently sent to the Minister. An overwhelming 97% of respondents opposed the 'reforms'.

This wave of public action was powered by supporters like Matt Watson, Tom Hishon (Kingi restaurant), Darren Shields (Wettie) and Tākuta Ferris (Te Pati Māori MP) who shared powerful videos across social media, urging followers to make a submission opposing the proposed 'reforms'.

Behind the scenes, our team invested time into meeting with MPs across the political spectrum to inform them about the risks of the proposed changes. We've built some strong relationships through this process that we will pursue further as we head into the 2026 election year.

FUNDRAISING

To succeed we need funds. A lack of funds over the past year has meant we have lost several valuable members of our team. We're working hard to maintain close relationships with our current Partners and Sponsors (see page 28 to view all Partners). In terms of grant seeking, we have been successful in several areas and continue to fulfil our commitments in reporting back to those generous entities. We are striving to secure sufficient funding so we can continue to push for positive change.

PARTNERS

We could not achieve our collective outcomes without our Partners. They help with funding, communication, supporter engagement, brand enhancement and materials. We continue to value the endorsement from ongoing Platinum and Gold partners and welcome the addition of 10 new Partners and LegaSea Works sponsors coming onboard to support our collective efforts.

Some key highlights from the year include:

- James Group and ITM Dysart, both LegaSea Platinum Partners hosted their annual Golf

Days and raised a combined \$12,000. Our team enjoyed running a stand at each event.

- Platinum Partner Whitehaven Wines, held their annual 100% Kōparepare campaign, where over a week 100% of the profits from every bottle of Kōparepare wine sold online was donated to LegaSea. The campaign raised more than \$18,000 towards our mahi. This brings Whitehaven's total contributions towards our cause to over \$204,000 since 2018.
- A big thank you to our Platinum Partner Bayleys for their generous support at this year's Fishing Classic, including matching the funds raised – a gesture that will go a long way in supporting our work. We loved being part of this catch-measure-photograph-release event, which promotes responsible fishing, with participants keeping a few to share and releasing the rest, especially the big ones.
- For over five years, Barkers have been proud supporters of LegaSea – creating a custom range of clothing and donating the proceeds to our kaupapa. In that time, they've raised over \$100K, kitted out our crew, joined us at events, and stood by us through some challenging moments in fisheries management. A huge thank you to the Barkers team for their generosity and commitment. Check out the LegaSea range in-store or online.

LEGASEA LEGENDS

We have a long-standing commitment that 100% of public and unaffiliated club donations to LegaSea are distributed to the NZSFC. These donations are earmarked specifically for investment in Advocacy, Research, Education and Alignment work streams.

Despite many Kiwis feeling the economic squeeze in recent years, it's encouraging to see an upwards trend in LegaSea Legend recurring payments. This is in response to our targeted fundraising campaign we launched for the Fisheries Reform Scam.

Looking ahead to 2026, we will be building on the momentum of our existing Legends while continuing to welcome new supporters to keep our boat afloat.

NZSFC AGM 2025: KAIKŌURA



Kaikōura put on a show. From the moment delegates arrived, the welcome was warm, the seafood was fresh, and the bar prices reminded everyone what good country hospitality feels like. The Kaikōura Boating and Recreational Fishing Club, led by Marty Sullivan, hosted the 69th Annual General Meeting of the New Zealand Sport Fishing Council with pride, passion, and unmistakable local flavour.

More than 50 clubs from across Aotearoa gathered to represent 38,000 members for two days of full-throttle discussion, decision-making, and connection. It wasn't just an AGM, it was a celebration of community, coastline, and the people who make recreational fishing the lifeblood of New Zealand.

NZSFC President Scott McIndoe opened proceedings with a call to unity and vigilance. He reminded delegates that recreational fishing rights are hard-won freedoms, and that every club has a duty to defend them. Quoting, "The price of freedom is eternal vigilance," he urged members to stay alert as government reforms loom.

Fisheries management took centre stage. Mark Connor, Katie Goodwin, and Sydney Curtis reported on 22 formal submissions, from Blue Cod and Rock Lobster to the Hauraki Gulf. The message was clear, that science, fairness, and transparency must guide decisions. A unanimous motion backed stronger advocacy for rebuilding rock lobster stocks and restoring healthy reef ecosystems.

Finance Chair Brett Rigby confirmed another clean audit, consolidated accounts with LegaSea, and a positive overall balance. Three new clubs came aboard, affiliation income grew, and a vehicle was purchased to support club visits nationwide. A new budget layout now links every dollar to a Standing Committee, showing members exactly how their fees are put to work.

Scott thanked outgoing Board members, acknowledged the huge workloads handled by Helen Pastor and Mike Plant, and welcomed Bjarne Morris to support special projects. He praised the professionalism of the LegaSea team, Sam Woolford, Jess Beetham, and crew, for turning practical conservation into national recognition through Kai Ika, Cans for Kai, and major partnerships.

The Hooked on Safety initiative drew strong support, setting NZSFC at the front of national fishing safety efforts. In collaboration with Coastguard through Bar Crossing seminars, Bluefin Tuna seminars, Wild Chicks training for women, and VHF tech upgrades are already saving lives. The Council's investment in membership to the Safer Boating Forum, Water Safety NZ and Drowning Prevention Aotearoa cements that commitment.

Youth participation shone too. The Youth Standing Committee confirmed record entries in the Youth Nationals, the inclusion of freshwater species, and the creation of a Youth Ocean Trust to fund safety and education projects.

While delegates debated in the Memorial Hall, partners explored Kaikōura's treasures including whale watching, lavender farms, and local gin tasting. Saturday night's dinner was a highlight. Local speaker Thomas Kahu shared the Whale Watch story about how Ngāti Kuri leaders turned a single boat into an eco-tourism success carrying 100,000 visitors a year.

The night closed with music, laughter, and the presentation of the Council's top awards including the Lord Norrie Gold Cup, Old Man of the Sea, Angler of the Year, Club of the Year, and Volunteer of the Year which celebrated those who give more than they take.

With sadness and laughter, we acknowledged the retirement of three long-term supporters of our Council: Bill McGarry, Peter Campbell, and John Holdsworth. We deeply appreciate all the work they have done for the Council and the unwavering support they have given our members over the years. Their dedication, knowledge, and commitment have made a significant and lasting contribution.

Kaikōura proved itself the perfect host. Great food, fair prices, flawless planning, and a community that welcomed every visitor with open arms. The Council leaves grateful and inspired.

Well done Kaikōura, you've set the standard for how an AGM should feel. The whole town made us proud.

NZSFC AGM 2026: MERCURY BAY

Mercury Bay Game Fishing Club has put its hand up to host the 2026 NZSFC AGM, and it's hard to imagine a better fit. Whitianga sits on the eastern side of the Coromandel peninsula, a coastline that has shaped generations of anglers. It's pristine, welcoming, and full of history. This is where sportfishing stories have been told and retold for nearly a century.

The Mercury Bay club was formed in 1925 as the Mercury Bay Swordfish and Mako Shark Club. It celebrates its 100th year in 2025, making it one of New Zealand's oldest and proudest gamefishing clubs. A founding member of the NZSFC, it has already hosted four AGMs, the most recent in 2006. Bringing the 70th NZSFC AGM back to Mercury Bay in 2026 would be both a centenary celebration and a long-overdue homecoming.

The club's location could not be better. Set right on the Esplanade, within walking distance of the town, ferry, and marina, it's a hub of fishing and community life. The modern clubhouse can host the AGM and prizegiving, with flexibility to use nearby venues like Whitianga Town Hall. Delegates would get the best of both worlds, the hospitality of the club and the charm of Whitianga itself.

Mercury Bay has a strong volunteer base and a track record of running major tournaments. The club's team has the experience, attitude, and organisation to handle logistics, hospitality, and delegate services with ease. When they host, they do it properly, with pride, humour, and a strong sense of belonging.

Getting there is easy, with Whitianga Airport offering flights from Auckland and shuttle links from Tauranga and Hamilton. For those coming by road, it's a comfortable two-and-a-half-hour drive from Hamilton, or just three from Tauranga and Auckland. The town also has a modern marina with over two hundred berths.

Accommodation is sorted. Whitianga offers more than 170 options including hotels, motels, campgrounds, holiday parks, and Airbnbs giving delegates and their partners choices from budget to beachfront luxury. Add the famous Coromandel attractions, from Cathedral Cove to The Lost Spring, and there's something for everyone, including families and partners.

Hosting the NZSFC AGM here brings our story full circle, a centenary for Mercury Bay and a milestone 70th for NZSFC. Two proud histories, meeting again where New Zealand gamefishing truly began.



CLUB OF THE YEAR 2025

WHAKATANE SPORT FISHING CLUB

Whakatāne Sportfishing Club has been named NZSFC Club of the Year for 2024–25, a title that perfectly sums up what this place means to its people and its coast. Established in 1966, the club sits on the Whakatāne Wharf, overlooking a harbour that has seen generations of families launch, learn, and return with stories worth sharing. With nearly 3,000 members, it is one of the largest fishing clubs in the country and a proud part of the NZSFC, LegaSea, the Youth Ocean Trust, and the New Zealand Marine Research Foundation.

Three-quarters of its members are locals, but its reach stretches across the country and beyond. Forty-five percent of members are women, the club is ethnically diverse, and its social membership is strong. The atmosphere is warm, welcoming, and genuinely community-driven.

The club's events are legendary. The Winter Tuna Tournament now draws more than 550 entrants and injects over 1.5 million dollars into the local economy, making it the biggest winter fishing event in New Zealand. Guppies on the Wharf, Ladies' training evenings, and junior tournaments have inspired hundreds of new anglers. Each event is built on education, innovation, and inclusion, from fish-care lessons and safety seminars to opportunities for disabled fishers to compete alongside everyone else.

Community involvement runs through everything. The club provides free facilities for local events, partners with schools, runs "Take a Kid Fishing" days, and supports programmes like Big Brother Big Sister and Wish for Fish. The Kai Ika initiative is thriving in Whakatāne, turning what was once waste into meals for whānau, while teaching filleting, handling, and sustainable practices that support local employment and reduce environmental impact.

Behind it all sits a small army of volunteers with more than 3,000 hours of effort every year, worth nearly \$80,000 at the living wage.

That commitment, combined with strong sponsorship and a lively online community of 9,700 followers, keeps the club connected and relevant.

Looking ahead, the club is preparing to reposition its buildings behind a new flood wall, securing its future and that of the wider Whakatāne community. It's a fitting next step for a club that has spent nearly sixty years doing what it does best, bringing people together, caring for the fishery, and proving that fishing can build a better, stronger community.

Congratulations Whakatāne Sportfishing Club! A club that isn't just a winner on paper. It's a living example of what happens when good people, great fishing, and community spirit all pull in the same direction.

Day one. The shotgun start. Four hundred and seventy boats charging out with engines roaring and hopes high. We were just one of many chasing glory, weaving through the fleet at twenty knots, still well behind the front-runners. The day played out with the usual mix of promise and patience, and as night fell, our boat *Wild Bill* joined the crowd anchored behind Arid Island, ready to reset and go again at sunrise.

Day two began with a clear sky and quiet confidence. Lures in the water, eyes on the spread, radios buzzing with half-stories and wishful thinking. Mid-afternoon came the call that would change everything, "let's try for a sword." Our crew had caught just about everything over the years, but never a Broadbill. That was about to change.

A good-sized squid bait was rigged on a circle hook, and the question went out, who's up first? After a few laughs and no volunteers, Graham Beaufill was nominated. Unopposed. Into the harness he went, and the bait dropped. Everyone watched the rod tip. Nothing. Then, at 3.20pm, a slow bend and the quiet words every crew loves "we're on."

At first it looked like a bluenose. Then a shark. The banter started, but when the fish changed direction and the skipper yelled, "it's got a bill," the mood shifted fast. The tag pole went down, the gaffs came up, and the fight was on.

Five and a half hours later, at 8.50pm, the broadbill came alongside the boat, heavy, glowing, and magnificent. By 9.00pm it was safely aboard, and the crew settled in for the six-hour run back to Whitianga. At 3.00am they eased into the harbour, tired but buzzing, ready for the 7.00am weigh-in.

The verdict: 320 kilograms on 60kg tackle. Day two catch, day three weigh, heaviest fish of the competition, and the overall winner of the 2025 Kubota and now NZSFC's *Old Man and the Sea*.

One fish. One crew. One hell of a memory.

ANGLER OF THE YEAR

MELANIE BROWN

2025 ANGLER OF THE YEAR, THE SAUL TROPHY FOR MOST TAGGED GAMEFISH, AND THE PETER AND NOELINE SHORT MEMORIAL TROPHY FOR MOST TAGGED BILLFISH

Mel Brown's season on the water has been one for the all time record books. Fishing out of Aotea Harbour for the Kawhia Boating and Angling Club, Mel has set a new standard for what determination, skill, and a love of the sea can achieve.

Across the 2024–25 season, Mel tagged an incredible forty one gamefish. This consisted of forty Striped Marlin and one Yellowfin Tuna. That effort alone would earn respect from any skipper or crew worldwide, but what makes it even more remarkable is that every one of those fish came from a trailer boat, fished hard and smart from the wild West Coast which provides limited weather windows.

Her Yellowfin Tuna, a solid fifty-seven kilos, has gone into the Kawhia Boating and Angling Club's record book as the Women's All Tackle record. It is also in the running for the club's Heaviest Yellowfin Trophy and Heaviest Other Fish award.

At this year's Kawhia One Base Tournament, Mel turned an already strong season into something special. Over three days she tagged and released six Striped Marlin, securing Top Female Angler, Top Overall Angler, and a win with her team. For anyone who understands the conditions off Kawhia, and how quickly they can turn, that result speaks volumes about her ability and attitude.

What stands out most about Mel's season isn't just the numbers. It's the consistency, the teamwork, and the way she carries herself on and off the water. Whether on the helm or on the tag pole, she shows the same mix of focus and good humour that every great angler brings to the crew.

Not content to stop there, Mel and her husband Ben headed south later in the season to tackle Southern Bluefin Tuna. Fishing off the rugged

South Island West Coast, she landed two fine fish and added another chapter to an already impressive year.

Mel's results have seen her now win three major NZSFC awards this year including Angler of the Year, the Saul Trophy for Most Tagged Gamefish, and the Peter and Noeline Short Memorial Trophy for Most Tagged Billfish.

From tagging Striped Marlin in wild seas to chasing Yellowfin and Bluefin across the coast, Mel Brown has shown what passion, perseverance, and pure enjoyment of fishing can achieve. Her season stands as an inspiration to every angler who believes anything is possible on the water.

VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

Every club needs that one person you can count on. The one who inspires others as they turn up early, stay late, and just get things done. For the Gisborne-Tatapouri Sports Fishing Club, that person is John Ballard.

John epitomises the club journey, as he started out as a junior member and, over the years, has become one of the club's most dependable hands. He's served on the committee more times than anyone can remember, always ready to help, always putting the club before himself.

He's the quiet force behind much of what keeps Gisborne-Tatapouri running. The shed, the weigh station, the driveway, the ramp, John takes ownership of them all. It's the kind of behind-the-scenes work that saves time, frustration, and possibly lives.

Then there's the fish tank. It might sound small, but anyone who's been inside the Tatapouri clubhouse knows it's part of the club's charm. John keeps it spotless, cleans the glass, changes the filters, and makes sure it always looks its best. It's a small act that says everything about how he approaches the job, with care, pride, and quiet precision.

TOP JUNIOR OF THE YEAR

TYLER SPEED



There are anglers who fish for fun, anglers who fish for food, and there are anglers who fish because it's who they are. For Tyler Speed, it's clearly the latter. A proud young member of the Mount Maunganui Sportfishing Club, Tyler has been hooked since the moment his mum Leesa let his dad Mike take him out on the family boat, Mayhem. He's been learning, watching, and asking questions ever since.

Most school holidays you'll find him down at Salisbury Wharf, rigging lines, swapping yarns, or glued to fishing videos from around the world. It's not just fascination, for Tyler, it's study. And the results speak for themselves. Over the 2024–25 season, Tyler hauled in more than 4,800 points across fifteen different species, steering Mayhem to the top of the club's boat standings.

He's tagged and released Broadbill Swordfish, Striped Marlin, Southern Bluefin Tuna, Yellowfin Tuna, and Yellowtail Kingfish. Every one of those fish represents patience, precision, and respect for the resource. Tyler fishes light and fishes smart, showing the kind of discipline that makes older anglers nod in quiet approval.

His competitive record is just as impressive. At the Form Building Blue Water Classic, he was one of only three anglers to land a marlin, taking first place in the Tag and Release section, winning the

Kingfish division, and still finding time to finish fourth in skipjack tuna. It's a list of results that would make most senior anglers proud, let alone one still in school.

Tyler's proudest achievement though came during this year's NZSFC Youth Nationals, where he claimed his fourth consecutive individual Champion Angler title, including three as a primary school student and now one in the secondary school ranks. Along the way he also secured the Top Club Award for Mount Maunganui, single-handedly keeping the club's flag flying high.

That tournament also delivered a milestone moment: his first tagged Broadbill Swordfish, the fish that sealed his victory in a fiercely competitive field. Add to that his growing mastery of ultra-light line classes, and you get a young angler with maturity well beyond his years.

Tyler Speed represents the future of our sport, humble, hungry, and full of promise. His success reminds us that the next generation isn't waiting for their turn. They're already out there, rods bent, writing the next chapter of New Zealand sportfishing.

LORD NORRIE CUP

For a season that saw many more Marlin migrate down the west coast, it was a day to remember at the Tauranga Sport Fishing Club on 7 February 2025 when John “Dutchie” Van Bussel weighed in a striped marlin that pulled the scales to 137.65 kilograms. Dutchie was fishing 37 kg tackle aboard Mariner with skipper Simon at the helm.

The fish put up a solid fight and was brought to the boat clean and steady.

It turned out to be a close race for glory as another angler had landed a marlin weighing exactly 137 kilograms. Dutchie's fish edged ahead by just 0.65 kilograms, enough to secure the Lord Norrie Cup for the heaviest striped marlin of the 2024–25 season.

It was a tight contest and a well-earned win, showing that sometimes the smallest margins make all the difference. A great result for Dutchie, skipper Simon, and the crew of Mariner, and a fine moment for the Tauranga Sport Fishing Club.

FROM TARANAKI TO THE PACIFIC

KIWI-TAGGED MARLIN WINS GLOBAL RACE

A striped marlin tagged off New Zealand's Taranaki coast has taken out top honours in the 2025 IGFA Great Marlin Race, marking the second consecutive year that a New Zealand-tagged fish has won this global conservation event.

The winning marlin, estimated at 120 kilograms, was caught by angler Phil Bell aboard Crusader and tagged by Captain Barry Govier on 7 February 2025. The tag, sponsored by the New Zealand Marine Research Foundation and the New Plymouth Sportfishing and Underwater Club, remained attached for 179 days before surfacing on 5 August 2025. In that time, the fish covered an extraordinary straight-line distance of 3,863 nautical miles and an estimated total journey of 5,771 nautical miles, surfacing 360 nautical miles south of the equator in the central Pacific.

Run by the International Game Fish Association (IGFA) in partnership with Stanford University, the Great Marlin Race transforms anglers into citizen scientists. Participants deploy satellite tags on billfish during tournaments and club events, with the tag that surfaces farthest from its deployment site declared the winner. Since its launch in 2011, more than 650 satellite tags have been deployed

worldwide, providing unprecedented insights into billfish migration and habitat use.

This year's race included 54 tags across 14 global events, contributing to a total tracked distance of 42,654 nautical miles. The data helps scientists better understand how marlin move across ocean basins and how these movements relate to changing ocean conditions.

For New Zealand, back-to-back wins show the contribution Kiwi anglers and clubs are making to global marine research, combining sport, science, and stewardship to protect the fish that define our blue-water heritage.



HOOKED ON SAFETY

Hooked on Safety began as a simple idea with a serious purpose. The fish of a lifetime is never worth your life. What started as a few local seminars on safety has grown into a nationwide movement led by the New Zealand Sport Fishing Council and powered by our clubs, partners, and volunteers. It is community driven education that has changed how we talk about safety and how we prepare to head out on the water.

The New Zealand Sport Fishing Council has secured new funding from Maritime NZ to continue delivering Hooked on Safety Bluefin Tuna and bar seminars through to June 2026. This investment acknowledges the difference our clubs are making in keeping people safe and proves that anglers, when supported and trusted, can lead change from within their own communities.

Over the past year, Hooked on Safety has delivered fifty seven bar crossing sessions to more than 1,800 anglers.. These sessions are practical and straight talking, run by people who understand the conditions we fish in. Skippers learn how to read a bar, plan a crossing, use VHF correctly, and check their boat and crew before they even get to the ramp. A simple checklist is now being developed through the programme to make sure every trip starts and ends safely.

If your club does not have a bar to cross, the safety sessions still come to you. The programme has expanded to include offshore bluefin tuna safety seminars that have already proven hugely successful, as well as new sessions on marlin, rock fishing, and beach launching. Every angler, every region, every type of fishing. No one is left out.

Even clubs without a local Coastguard unit are covered. These seminars are delivered in association with Coastguard New Zealand, helping educate members about what they can do even without a local base. The focus is on access, giving every club the knowledge and tools to keep members safe, not just those in big coastal centres.



This new Maritime NZ funding means we can now grow Hooked on Safety even further. Plans are already underway for youth fishing camps, more women's boating workshops, and online learning tools. Each of these projects helps anglers make smarter decisions so every trip home is a safe one.

In just two years, this campaign has changed how we think about safety. From the Bay of Islands to Riverton, our clubs have hosted seminars on bar crossings, tuna runs, offshore prep, and survival skills. Together we have reached more than 3,600 people through almost one hundred live events, with thousands more connecting through podcasts, media stories, and social channels.

The Bluefin Tuna pre-season seminars are now a cornerstone of the programme. Built in partnership with Coastguard, these events bring skippers, crews, and families together to share local knowledge and lessons learned. Each one feels like a community night, with people talking openly about what works, what does not, and what can save your life when things go wrong.

The results are clear. Record numbers of bar watches called through to Coastguard, no serious bar incidents through summer, thousands of volunteer hours, and more than four million people reached through national

media. Success is built on teamwork. NZSFC works closely with Maritime New Zealand, Water Safety New Zealand, Coastguard, Drowning Prevention Auckland, Surf Lifesaving, Auckland Council, and ACC. Each organisation plays a part, but the driving force is our clubs and the anglers who show up, listen, learn, and pass that knowledge on.

Technology has helped too. VHF and cell coverage upgrades at club locations, new live stream bar cameras being installed, and local weather data have all given fishers better tools to make good calls before leaving shore. Hooked on Safety is not just about behaviour. It is about making sure every skipper has access to the right information at the right time.

The programme has also found its voice in policy. For the first time, NZSFC was formally recognised in the coronial process for its leadership in preventing avoidable deaths. That recognition means a lot. It shows that education works, and that change happens when the fishing community leads from within. Hooked on Safety is now a respected model for community based prevention.

The Pod and Reel podcast series has played a powerful role in that conversation. Episodes sharing stories like Will Fransen's 24 hours at sea or the Gisborne bluefin tragedy have brought hard truths to life in a way that statistics never could. They are stories that stick with you, and they make every skipper think twice before heading out.

From club nights to seminars, from podcasts to checklists, Hooked on Safety has become more than a campaign. It is a shared promise. A promise that every club, every angler, and every crew member makes to plan well, look out for one another, and always bring everyone home.

This is what leadership looks like when it comes from the deck, not the boardroom. It is what happens when volunteers, clubs, and partners pull together for something bigger than themselves. Hooked on Safety belongs to all of us. It has shown that a culture of safety can grow the same way our sport has always grown through people who care enough to show up, share what they know, and make the water safer for everyone.

OPENING THE WATER TO EVERYONE

Fishing brings people together. Out on the water it does not matter who you are or what your challenges may be. The tug on the line feels the same. The thrill is the same. The sense of freedom is something every New Zealander should have the chance to experience.

FishABLE was formed under the New Zealand Sport Fishing Council's Disability Committee to make that possible. It started with a simple question. How can we help more people with disabilities get out fishing and feel part of our community? The answer came through passion, persistence, and teamwork.

Committee members Steve Cox, Chris Randrup, Bryce Dinneen MNZM, Heyden Johnston, Helen Pastor, and Mike Plant have all helped shape the direction of this work. They have drawn inspiration from successful programmes like Wish4Fish and shared the same goal. To remove barriers, open opportunities, and create genuine inclusion through recreational fishing.

FishABLE is focused on helping clubs become more accessible and on recognising the achievements of anglers with disabilities. Two participation categories are being developed. The first recognises unassisted anglers who meet standard rules but may fish with physical challenges. The second celebrates assisted anglers who fish with help, with success measured by merit and effort rather than weight alone.

These new categories will sit within the Council's national framework, allowing anglers of all abilities to take part, compete, and be acknowledged for their skill and determination.

FishABLE also aims to encourage clubs to host open days, provide access to adaptive equipment

such as the Striker system, and share designs and ideas that make fishing more inclusive. The goal is not only to create opportunities but to build confidence, connection, and community spirit across our clubs.

This initiative represents a real step forward for our sport. It reflects the values that have always guided NZSFC. Participation, belonging, and the simple joy of fishing together. FishABLE reminds us that the water belongs to everyone, and that every cast counts when it helps someone discover the freedom and pride that comes with fishing.

7. **Fisherman of the Year:** Will be awarded to the angler who catches the heaviest recognised Game fish of the season. Each club must forward their nomination to the Secretary prior to July 7 each year.
8. **The Peter & Noeline Short Memorial Trophy:** Will be awarded for the most Tagged Billfish of the Season. Each Club must forward their nomination to the Secretary prior to July 7 each year.
9. **The Top Junior Angler Cup:** Will be awarded annually to the junior angler who catches the most meritorious catch of the season. It is not necessary for the fish to score the most points. Each club must forward their nomination including a description about how the catch was achieved and what makes it meritorious, to the Secretary prior to July 7 each year.
10. **The Hart Trophy:** For the best live Marine photograph taken by an amateur photographer
11. **Angler of the Year:** Open to all anglers that have competed successfully at Club, National and International level, and contributed to the sport of Sport Fishing.
12. **The Volunteer of the year:** Open to all volunteers who have contributed to the sport of fishing.
13. **The Club of the Year:** Open to all clubs that have competed successfully, shown an outstanding ability to provide for its members and contributed to the community.
14. Certificates will be awarded for all line class species and other species that the Council chooses
These Certificates will be awarded for the -
 - a. First Fish of the Season Weighed or Tagged
 - b. Heaviest Fish of the Season
 - c. 5, 10, 15 & 20 -1 ClubClubs should forward their nominations to the Council Secretary as soon as possible after the fish is weighed or tagged.

2026 NZSFC NATIONALS' RULES

21 FEBRUARY 2026 TO 28 FEBRUARY 2026

Please note the following rule changes for the 2026 Nationals.

1. **Sharks** - No sharks will be weighed in the 2026 NZSFC Nationals

NOTE

In all situations if any aggregate points category is tied at the end of the tournament, the angler or team to boat/release their last fish first is deemed to be the winner, date and time of boating or release must be recorded on the catch card (if no time is stated then it will default to 11:59pm Therefore it is imperative that catch or tag times are noted.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The New Zealand "Nationals" shall form the arena in which anglers from throughout New Zealand compete, club against club, team against team and angler against angler for the honour of winning various trophies and titles that have been offered for this tournament.

The 'Council' will determine the rules and conditions that will apply to this tournament.

The 'Council' will determine the dates and hours of fishing the tournament.

In addition to the NZSFC Nationals Tournament Rules and Conditions, the following will also apply:

1. The NZSFC Fishing Rules and Regulations are incorporated as tournament rules. Only fish caught in accordance with these Fishing Rules and regulations and within the intent of these rules will qualify for the tournament.
2. All current New Zealand Laws and Regulations regarding the taking of fish in New Zealand territorial waters.

The New Zealand Sport Fishing Council reserves the right to use any information received by it through results sheets of the

NATIONAL TOURNAMENT for publicity, statistical, or other purposes that may be beneficial to the Council or it's membership.

1. JUDICIAL COMMITTEE

A Judicial Committee will be appointed prior to the tournament starting. The Judicial Committee's decisions shall be final on all matters pertaining to the contest, and any controversy arising over interpretation of these rules. Any dispute relating to the weight of a fish must be lodged with the weighmaster prior to the fish being removed from the weigh station. All other disputes must be lodged in writing and emailed or faxed to the tournament secretary within 48 hours of the tournament ending.

The judicial committee may delay the final results if any dispute requires further investigating. Final results will then be announced, with no subsequent protests or disputes being accepted.

2. SAFETY

Although the Tournament has been arranged for 8 days, it is the skipper's responsibility to determine that on any one day, the sea conditions and weather forecasts are safe for his/her boat to put to sea. The Tournament is being run nationwide and the fact that boats may be fishing in one area, is not to be taken as an indicator that it is safe to fish in any other area. It is each Skipper's responsibility to ensure that the boat they intend to participate in is capable of putting to sea safely.

It is the Skipper's responsibility to ensure that the boat carries the minimum legal safety equipment and flotation aids, including the requirements of local Coastguard/Regional Council, or any other local body that has assumed control over the waterways and ocean that the team intend to fish in.

Each boat must have a reliable means of communication, with the expectation that they can make contact, or be contacted at all times. Each Boat must return to port, or report to their base each day. Any club who is made aware of a Skipper who has put to sea against the advice or directions of one of the authorities named above, or who has not met minimum safety requirements in equipment must report the matter to the Tournament Secretary, and the Judicial Committee will consider the complaint and can disqualify the team. Any such disqualification will also disqualify any catches previously weighed by that team for the Tournament.

Land Based, Kayak, and personal Watercraft teams will suffer the same penalties if they are found to have ignored advice from officers of surf lifesaving clubs operating in the area.

3. INFRACTIONS

Any person, club, boat skipper or crew, guilty of infraction of the rules could be disqualified from participation in this or any other NZ Sport Fishing Council contest.

4. ELIGIBILITY AND CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

All team members must be financial members of an affiliated club. Team members that enter as a day member must pay the day membership fee for each and every day (8 days), irrespective of how many days the team member actually fishes.

All clubs being represented in the National Tournament must be affiliated to, and be financial members of the New Zealand Sport Fishing Council Inc. For the Club to be considered financial their fees must be paid and in the NZSFC account prior to the Tournament commencing.

Junior anglers must be under the age of 17 years at the conclusion of the tournament.

All teams must have access to a copy of the rules for the National Tournament.

All teams must nominate a member who will be responsible for the receiving of information for that team, and for certifying that the above conditions have been met.

All information given to the **nominated member shall be deemed to have been given to the whole team.**

A signed entry form, accompanied by the appropriate entry fees for the whole team must be lodged with the club the team is fishing for, before an entry is valid.

5. REGISTRATION

A registration fee of \$25 per angler (inclusive of GST) must accompany the official entry form and be paid to the club the angler is representing.

All teams must register **at the headquarters of the club they are going to represent** in the tournament. Correct registration is the team's responsibility through their nominated member.

All team members must be registered, and registration fees paid **before** they commence fishing. New teams, and additional team members can register after the tournament has started but registrations must be completed, registration fees paid, and the Tournament Secretary notified before they commence fishing.

When members of unincorporated clubs are entering the Nationals and fishing for Council trophies, they must prove they are a separate club in their own right and not part of another club, as indicated in the Bylaws.

6. CLUB RESPONSIBILITIES

All participating clubs must have a nominated recorder, who will be the official contact for the Tournament Secretary for all matters relating to the tournament.

The preferred method of receiving and transmitting results will be by email. Council would expect all clubs to make a serious attempt to comply with this preference.

All participating clubs must have an email address to receive and transmit results and other information between the club and tournament secretary.

All catches must be relayed to the tournament secretary on the day the fish is weighed or tagged. A day being 6 am to 6 pm (see rule 9).

Daily catch results must be transmitted to the Tournament Secretary not later than 7.30 pm each day and be certified as true and correct. (Certifying will eliminate the need to send catch certificates in) **Nil returns are just as important as positive returns!**

Final catch results must reach the Tournament Secretary prior to 8 pm on the last fishing day of the tournament. The results for Day 8 will be sent as Day 8's results but Recorders and Anglers will have 48hrs from the time provisional results are publicly released to check that all fish have been entered and recorded correctly.

Tagged fish must be reported as soon as possible after the fish has been tagged but must not be notified to the Tournament Secretary until such times as the card has been sighted electronically or physically by the Club the team is fishing for unless prior arrangements have been made. All tagged fish must be reported by the club to NZSFC by 8 pm on the final day.

All affiliated clubs must provide courtesy weighing and email/fax reporting to all anglers fishing in the tournament in line with Rule 13.

Clubs who have teams fishing away from their home base should make every effort to make sure they are aware of their obligations under Rule 13.

Clubs must provide competent weighmasters to officiate during the clubs weighing times.

Clubs should hold a pre-tournament briefing to make teams aware of their responsibilities as regards all aspects of the tournament – Local Coastguard/Harbour rules, radio frequencies and weigh station times.

Clubs must have available copies of the Council booklet for teams to purchase or copies of the rules so there is no excuse for teams to be ignorant of the rules

7. TEAMS

Teams will be identified by a team name as well as a team number. The Council will, through the clubs, allocate the team number.

All members of the team must fish for the same club, and at least one member of the team must belong to the club they are fishing for. A team must comprise not less than two (2) and not more than ten (10) persons. There must not be less than two members of the same team on the boat at any one time and in the interests of safety at least one person on the boat should be over the age of 18 years.

If for any reason the responsible member is changed, the tournament secretary must be notified as soon as possible.

MORE THAN ONE team may fish off the same boat, but all teams must be fishing the Nationals tournament.

Teams may change boats during the tournament but must retain the same team name and number. At any one time, all members of the team who are fishing must be on the same boat.

No substitute of a team may be made after registration without the consent of the tournament secretary (generally it should not be expected to have substitutes approved after the tournament has commenced).

In the case of land based anglers, at any one time, all members of the team who are fishing must, be on a stretch of uninterrupted foreshore, must be in sight of one another, and without the use of aids, be close enough together to be able to call to one another. Or if fishing from a structure, (such as a wharf or jetty) all members must fish from the structure.

In the case of Kayak and Watercraft anglers, at any one time, all members of the team who are fishing must be in sight of one another, and without the use of aids, be close enough together to be able to call to one another. They must have all prescribed safety equipment deemed appropriate for Kayak and Watercraft users. As per team numbers rule, minimum of two anglers (that may fish on one kayak or watercraft, or individual watercrafts) and no more than 10 anglers allowed.

With the exception of the rule regarding the catching of bait, only team members may fish from the boat during the tournament, and only team members may catch any of the fish as listed under Rule 15 Species. Guests, spectators and crew on the boat who are not team members may assist with the boating of tournament fish. When no game fishing tackle is in the water, they may assist with the catching of baitfish but may not catch any of the tournament species.

Fish should be weighed from the boat they were caught from, whether on their boat trailer or in the water. Fish can only be transferred to another boat for the purpose of weighing the catch in exceptional circumstances. For safety reasons, a fish may be transferred to take to a weigh station as long as the boat on which the fish is caught is in sight of weigh station, or within one nautical mile of the weigh station. The only other exceptions are if the angler or anglers as a team are changing boat because of availability, or in an emergency i.e. a breakdown. In both these situations their catch when weighed will have to be ratified by the disputes committee. This rule does not apply to Land based Anglers. Catch cards for weighed fish and Tag cards for tagged fish should also be handed in or reported from the boat the team is fishing from by a representative of the team.

It is the team's responsibility to make themselves familiar with the rules.

Teams will nominate a responsible member on the registration form. Any official information given to the responsible member shall be deemed to have been given to the whole team.

8. ANGLERS

Anglers may change teams **but must not start fishing** from the new team until the tournament secretary has been notified of the change.

Anglers who change teams shall leave all team points behind but will take individual points with them.

9. FISHING DAYS AND TIMES

The tournament will run for eight days, finishing on the last Saturday in February. Teams can start fishing at 6 am on the first day. All catch cards must be sighted by a weighmaster or recorder by 4pm on the final day.

There is no lines out of the water time, an angler may fish until such time as they believe that if they land a fish they can have their catch card for weighed fish sighted by a weighmaster of the club weighing the fish **by 4pm** on the final day. There is no playing out of fish after **4pm** on the final day. All fish must be reported to NZSFC by the Club the team is fishing for by 8 pm on the final day.

10. AREA

The tournament will be fished in that area of water bounded by a line 200 miles from New Zealand's two main islands. The provisions of Rule 14 reporting of catches, Rule 11 Weighing, and Rule 2 Safety, must be adhered to.

11. WEIGH STATION AND EQUIPMENT

All fish must be caught on rod and reel only (handlines are permitted only for the catching of bait). All fish must be weighed in the line class of the line manufacturers rating of the line used. All tackle must comply with NZSFC Fishing Rules and Regulations. **Only non-offset circle hooks can be used to catch Billfish when using live and dead natural baits.**

All fish must be weighed or Tag cards presented at the official weigh stations for the tournament i.e. weigh stations are as listed in the front of the NZSFC yearbook, plus any others notified to and accepted by the tournament secretary prior to the tournament.

All tackle and equipment used in the capture of the fish shall be presented to the weighmaster for inspection. The timing of the presentation/ inspection is dependent on if the fish is weighed or Tagged (refer below to Section 11a and 11b). In the event that any of the tackle or equipment is incomplete or cannot be presented to the weighmaster, **(exception- please see note in 11b Tag & Release regarding hooks cut free)** the catch will be deemed incomplete and the fish will not qualify for the tournament.

Any matters where the weighmaster cannot make a final decision on, they are to notify the tournament secretary in writing within 24 hours explaining the situation, so the judicial committee can make a final call on the eligibility of the catch for the tournament.

11a. Weighing

All fish must be weighed within 36 hours of being caught.

All tackle and equipment used in the capture of the fish shall be presented to the weighmaster for inspection at the time of weighing.

Weighmasters have the right to inspect any gear on the boat at any time of weighing.

11b. Tag and Release (T & R)

Tag cards must be sighted either physically or electronically by the Club the team is fishing for, (this can be replayed via VHF if no electronic coverage is available), within 36 hours of being tagged, noting that the closing time for all submissions is 4 pm on the final day.

All tackle and equipment used in the capture of a T & R fish MUST be presented to a weighmaster or IGFA Rep for inspection when the hardcopy Tag card is submitted. **For all Billfish, Sharks & Large Tuna in the event the hook cannot be safely removed or in the best interests of fish welfare, it is acceptable to cut the leader as close as practically possible to the hook and release the fish, the trace must still be presented to the weighmaster for inspection /measuring along with all other tackle and equipment.**

Where Tags have been submitted electronically, the original Hardcopy card must be submitted (including equipment inspection) within 24 hours of the tournament ending. Failure to hand in any tag card within this timeframe will result in the tagged fish being removed from the tournament.

All Tag cards (Incl Kingfish) must be accompanied by photographic evidence of the Tag clearly inserted into the caught fish. This may be a still photo or video. **Failure to provide photographic evidence which confirms the placement of the Tag and species of the fish will result in the tagged fish being removed from the tournament.**

Formula basis

The formula is the weight of the fish times 100 divided by the line weight for weighed fish.

Tagged and released points are as follows:

- Blue & Black Marlin, Broadbill & Striped Marlin - 600 points
- Spearfish - 100 points
- Shark - 100 points
- Tuna (yellowfin, bluefin, bigeye, butterfly) 150 points
- Yellowtail - 25 points

These tag and release points are regardless of line weight (but must be within the line weights referred to in 15 (Species Section 1).

Points are gained by:

For Blue & Black Marlin, Broadbill, Striped Marlin, Shortbill Spearfish, Tuna, Shark and Yellowtail **all tagged fish will score points along with the top 3 scoring fish weighed. Only the top 3 scoring Mahimahi, Albacore, (Skipjack, & Slender Tuna combined), Snapper, Kahawai, and Trevally will count in their sections.**

Courtesy weighing

All clubs must provide courtesy weighs for all anglers fishing the Nationals. They must also provide recording and reporting of catches to the angler. It is the Angler's / Team's responsibility to ensure that the copy of the weighsheet is submitted to the club that they are fishing for. (The general rule should be that visiting anglers should have available to them, the same hours of weighing and reporting services, as a local angler).

All participating anglers wishing to use the courtesy weigh facility of another club must abide by the rules and conditions for weighing at the host club as though they were a member of that club. **It is the visiting teams' responsibility to ensure that their team is familiar with any such rules and conditions.**

ALL PARTICIPATING ANGLERS WISHING TO USE THE COURTESY WEIGH FACILITY OF ANOTHER CLUB MUST INFORM THE HOST CLUB AS SOON AS SUCH A REQUIREMENT BECOMES APPARENT.

Any team intending fishing away from their home base and intending to use courtesy weigh facilities must inform prospective hosts in advance and make their intentions known.

Weigh sheets used for courtesy weighing must be from the club providing the courtesy weigh. Two forms must be filled in, prior to weighing of the fish. One weigh sheet is for the club providing the courtesy weigh, and the other is for the angler to take back to their club for their records. This is the angler's responsibility.

If the words > courtesy, consideration, and common sense < are kept to the fore courtesy weighing should not present a problem

12. REPORTING OF CATCHES

All fish (Species Section 1 only) must be reported as soon as possible after being boated, to the weigh station or club where the fish is expected to be weighed, giving the following details: Angler, Team Number, Team Name, Species and the time boated.

All fish tagged and released must be reported daily as soon as possible after the release to the weigh station or club and to the Tournament Secretary. The tag card must be sighted either physically or electronically by the club the team is fishing for (this can be relayed via VHF if no electronic coverage is available). Please refer to rule 11b Tag & Release for final handing in of tag cards and tackle and equipment checking for tag & released fish.

- Blue & Black Marlin
- Broadbill
- Striped Marlin

Mahimahi Shark (blue shark, bronze whaler, hammerhead shark, mako shark, thresher shark, tiger shark, porbeagle). **Tag & Release only**

- Tuna (yellowfin, bluefin, bigeye, butterfly).
- Yellowtail

Section 2

To be fished in the following line classes

10kg, 8kg, 6kg, 4kg, 3kg, 2kg, 1kg

- Slender & Skipjack Tuna
- Albacore,
- Snapper,
- Kahawai,
- Trevally

14. CATCH RESTRICTIONS

Each angler can weigh a maximum of 3 fish per species per day for the Tournament apart from Sharks. The 3 fish restriction applies to Length for Points fish also. Where weighed and flyfishing are referred too, there are respective sections/categories with tippet referring to flyfishing.

Minimum weights and lengths for fish in all sections are:

Blue & Black Marlin

Weighed incl. Fly Fishing Must equal or exceed 90 kg

Tag & Release - No minimum

Broadbill

Weighed incl. Fly Fishing **Must equal or exceed 90 kg**

Tag & Release - No minimum

Striped Marlin

Weighed incl. Fly Fishing Must equal or exceed 90 kg

Tag & Release - No minimum

Shortbill Spearfish

Weighed incl. Fly Fishing Must equal or exceed 10 kg

Tag & Release - No minimum

Mahimahi

Weighed incl. Fly Fishing - Must equal or exceed 4 kg on line weights 15kg and above. On line/tippet weights 10 kg and below there is no minimum fish weight
No Tag & Release

Shark (all species as listed under No14. Species)

Tag & Release Only - 122 cm or 4 feet

Tuna - Bluefin, Bigeye and Butterfly

Weighed incl. Fly Fishing - Must equal or exceed line/tippet weight

Tag & Release - No minimum

Yellowfin Tuna

Weighed incl. Fly Fishing - Minimum weight is 15 kg on line 15 kg and above. On line/tippet weights 10 kg and below the fish must equal or exceed the line weight

Tag & Release - No minimum

Yellowtail

Weighed incl. Fly Fishing - Must equal or exceed Line/ tippet weight and must meet/ exceed 75 cm in length

Tag & Release - 75cm in length or greater

Albacore, Snapper, Kahawai, Skipjack & Slender Tuna and Trevally - No Tag and Release

On line/tippet weights 1, 2 & 3 kg

Weighed Must equal or exceed 1 kg

Fly fishing Must equal or exceed 1 kg

On line/tippet weights 4, 6, 8 & 10 kg

Weighed Must equal or exceed 2 kg

Fly fishing Must equal or exceed 2 kg

Note: (Tagged Sharks - it is not intended that anglers or crew should risk injury trying to measure sharks to the millimeter but should use the best possible estimate using any practical aid eg a mark on a gaff handle or length of cord).

Will be awarded to the team with the most points from **the three top scoring fish from each of the 13 species.**

- Blue & Black Marlin - Air New Zealand Trophy
- Broadbill - Moutere Magic Trophy
- Striped Marlin - John Hough Memorial Trophy
- Shortbill Spearfish - Waihou Bay Trophy
- Mahimahi - The Dennis Davey Trophy
- Shark - NZI Trophy
- Tuna - City of Auckland Trophy
- Yellowtail - Westpac Trophy
- Albacore - Hickey Sports Trophy
- Skipjack & Slender Tuna Wasabi Trophy & Tautuku Fishing Club Trophy - (Slender Tuna only)

• Snapper - Sheryl Hart Trophy

• Kahawai - Black Magic Trophy

• Trevally - Pursuit Trophy

Each species may be fished for on line weights as allocated for that species in RULE 15 on the formula basis.

Points are gained by:

For Blue & Black Marlin, Broadbill, Striped Marlin, Shortbill Spearfish, Tuna, Shark and Yellowtail all tagged fish will score points along with the top 3 scoring fish weighed. Only the top 3 scoring Mahimahi, Albacore, (Skipjack, & Slender Tuna combined), Snapper, Kahawai, and Trevally will count in their sections.

NOTE

In all situations if any aggregate points category is tied at the end of the tournament, the angler or team to boat/release their last fish first, is deemed to be the winner. Date and time of boating or release must be recorded on the catch card (if no time is stated then it will default to 11:59pm Therefore it is imperative that catch or tag times are noted

SECTION 2

Champion New Zealand Anglers

- Individual Anglers

The most meritorious catch on the formula basis for the fish scoring the highest points.

SECTION 3

NZ Champion Line Weight Anglers

- Weighed Fish

The winner will be the angler with the heaviest single fish in each line weight and each game fish species.

NZ Champion Line Weight Anglers

- Tagged Fish

The winner will be the angler with the most fish in each line weight in the following species:- Blue & Black Marlin, Broadbill & Striped Marlin. In the event of the same number of fish being tagged and released on one line weight the angler who tags his last fish first will be deemed the winner.

SECTION 4

NZ Champion Blue & Black Marlin Angler

The winner will be the angler with the most accumulated points (landed and tagged fish). The points to come from the top 3 scoring fish weighed plus all fish tagged and released

NZ Champion Broadbill Angler

The winner will be the angler with the most accumulated points (landed and tagged fish). The points to come from the top 3 scoring fish weighed plus all fish tagged and released

NZ Champion Striped Marlin Angler

The winner will be the angler with the most accumulated points (landed and tagged fish). The points to come from the top 3 scoring fish weighed plus all fish tagged and released

NZ Champion Shortbill Spearfish Angler

The winner will be the angler with the most accumulated points (landed and tagged fish). The points to come from the top 3 scoring fish weighed plus all fish tagged and released.

SECTION 5

Carol Atwood Memorial Trophy

This trophy will be awarded for the most meritorious tuna caught during the tournament (tuna scoring most points).

SECTION 6

Tag And Release Section

The winner will be the angler tagging and releasing the most fish in each of the seven species sections, namely Blue & Black Marlin, Broadbill, Striped Marlin, Shortbill Spearfish, Shark, Yellowtail & Tuna. In the event of more than one angler tagging and releasing the same number of fish, the winner will be the angler who tagged his last fish first.

Only fish tagged with the Council approved tags will count.

Released fish not tagged do not count.

SECTION 7

Overseas Team

The winning team will be the one scoring the highest aggregate points in the thirteen species sections.

To qualify as an Overseas Team, one member must reside overseas. Only the top three scoring fish will count.

SECTION 8

Champion New Zealand Junior Anglers - Individual Anglers

The most meritorious catch by a Junior Angler on the formula basis for a weighed fish scoring the highest points in each of the thirteen species sections, namely Albacore, Blue & Black Marlin, Broadbill, Striped Marlin, Shortbill Spearfish, Mahimahi, Tuna, Skipjack & Slender Tuna (combined), Yellowtail, Snapper, Kahawai, and Trevally.

SECTION 9

New Zealand Junior Champion Blue & Black Marlin Angler

The winner will be the angler with the most accumulated points (landed and tagged fish). The points to come from the top 3 scoring Blue & Black Marlin weighed plus all Blue & Black Marlin tagged and released.

New Zealand Junior Champion Broadbill Angler

The winner will be the angler with the most accumulated points (landed and tagged fish). The points to come from the top 3 scoring Broadbill weighed plus all Broadbill tagged and released.

New Zealand Junior Champion Striped Marlin Angler

The winner will be the angler with the most accumulated points (landed and tagged fish). The points to come from the top 3 scoring Striped Marlin weighed plus all Striped Marlin tagged and released.

New Zealand Junior Champion Shortbill Spearfish Angler

The winner will be the angler with the most accumulated points (landed and tagged fish). The points to come from the top 3 scoring Shortbill Spearfish weighed plus all Shortbill Spearfish tagged and released.

SECTION 10

Fly Fishing Section

The winner will be the angler with the heaviest single fish in each tippet class and each game fish species.

SECTION 11

Interclub Competition

An Interclub competition is to be held in conjunction with the tournament. The following rules relate to the Interclub:

Will be awarded to the overall Club scoring the most points. Only the top 3 scoring fish will count.

Clubs will be split into regional winners and certificates will be awarded for first placings. Zones can purchase their own trophies to present if they wish.

SECTION 14

Top Team From Each Club

Will be awarded to the team with the most points from the top scoring fish from each of the 13 species.

Regional Section

Teams will be split into regional winners and certificates will be awarded for first placings. Zones can purchase their own trophies to present if they wish.

CD Rods Top Team – New Zealand Wide

Will be awarded to the team with the most points from the top scoring fish from each of the 13 species.

NOTES FOR RECORDERS

NUMBER ONE RULE: PLEASE READ THE RULES

NO BRAID TO BE USED IN THIS EVENT EXCEPT WHEN USED AS BACKING, AS DEFINED IN THE NZSFC FISHING RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All Clubs must appoint a Recorder who is willing to check the results each evening – especially those clubs with anglers fishing away from home
2. Entry Numbers' and a 'Team Details Form' along with a 'Results Schedule Form' will be sent to each Club prior to the contest. You will need a Results Schedule form for each of the days.
3. Please remember that **Teams must register with the Club they will represent**. If they intend to fish from another location/Club they must still register with their club they intend to represent. Each Club will forward the results for the Teams fishing for them.
4. The Team Details sheet needs to be emailed/ faxed to the Tournament Secretary as soon as details are to hand. **Results must be sent on the day the fish are weighed. Results for Tagged fish should be sent when the card has been sighted either electronically or physically by the Club the team is fishing for unless prior arrangements have been made.**
5. The Daily Results Schedule needs to be emailed/faxed to the Tournament Secretary prior to 7.30 pm each evening. All fish weighed, and tag cards sighted (physically or electronically) that day must be written on this sheet. Results after 7.30 pm will go into the next day's tally (except on the final night of course). **A 'Nil' return by phone or email speeds up the results – very necessary on the final night.**
6. Result Sheets are certified correct by the Recorder, it is therefore important that the Recorders check all results as they come out each night. **All Tag cards must be sighted by the Club the team is fishing for and reported only when they have been sighted either physically or electronically.**
7. Teams and anglers can be added at any stage during the contest. Please ensure the 'extras' are emailed/faxed to the Tournament Secretary on a Team Details Sheet – please send the 'additions' only or mark very clearly where the additional teams and anglers start.
8. To make life simple if you have any further entries, additions to teams, or other queries it would be appreciated if these were dealt with during the day to leave the evening free for results to be processed.
9. **Once the tournament has ended, each club will be invoiced based on their number of entries. There is a \$6 deduction for club administration. This payment is to be forwarded to the Secretary, NZSFC, PO Box 54242, The Marina, Half Moon Bay, Auckland 2144, or paid by direct payment to NZSFC bank account as soon as possible after the club has received an invoice from the Secretary.**
10. **Recorders and Anglers have 48 hours after the Tournament finishes to check that all their fish have been entered and are correct.**

HOW TO WIN THE YOUTH NATIONALS

BY BROCK JOHNSON PREVIOUS 2 X WINNER OF THE NZSFC YOUTH NATIONALS, YOUNGEST IGFA REPRESENTATIVE FOR NEW ZEALAND AND WEIGHMASTER FOR COUNTIES SPORTS FISHING CLUB

Winning the Youth Nationals isn't just about being the best. It's about having fun, staying calm, and trusting your gear when things get tough. Fishing light line, especially one kilogram, really tests you. Every move counts. You can't just crank the fish in. You've got to play it smart and let the gear do the work. It's as much a mental game as it is a physical one.

Before the comp starts, I spend a lot of time preparing. I check every knot, make sure my reels are smooth, and set the drag just right. I like fishing light but strong. My go-to gear is a Shimano Stella 1000 or Daiwa Exist with a 1 to 3 kg T-Curve or TD Sol rod. I spool it with IGFA-rated 1 kg Platypus or Momoi line and tie on a short 4 to 6 lb fluoro leader. Around 300 grams of drag feels right.

The trick is keeping everything smooth. Smooth knots, smooth drag, smooth hands. One bad knot can wreck your day. Light line fishing isn't about power. It's about patience and control. You have to trust your setup and keep calm.

I always watch the weather before a comp and change my plan if things look rough. My family helps heaps. Dad takes time off work to get me out there and Mum helps with meals and prep. During the comp, I keep an eye on the leaderboard and adjust if I need to.

The Youth Nationals are about learning, challenging yourself, and having a blast with your mates and family. Every fish teaches you something new.

HOW TO TROLL

BY LOUIE TAYLOR AGED 13 WHAKATANE SFC

Trolling is one of the most exciting ways to fish, but it's not always easy. You need patience, the right setup, and a bit of luck. The speed of your lure makes a huge difference to how many fish you hook. This is a quick guide on how to troll, what to look for, and how to land your fish safely once it's hooked.

When to go fishing depends on what you are targeting. Swordfish come up from the depths at night, using moonlight to spot prey. Pacific Yellowfin Tuna are active during the day and often breach the surface. Blue Marlin hunt during daylight, using their vision to chase squid and smaller fish. So, any time can be the right time if you know your target and are prepared to go the distance.

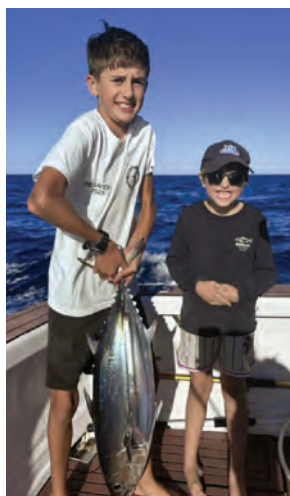
Lure setup matters a lot. Outriggers give your lures width and spread. Place your lure just in front of the shotgun. The shotgun lure sits right down the middle behind both outriggers, often in the boat's wake where fish can see it clearly.

Short corners are closer to the boat where you can run your largest lures 10 to 20 metres back, just skimming the surface. Deep divers help when fish show up on the sounder below 40 metres. Trolling speeds of 8 to 10 knots usually work well.

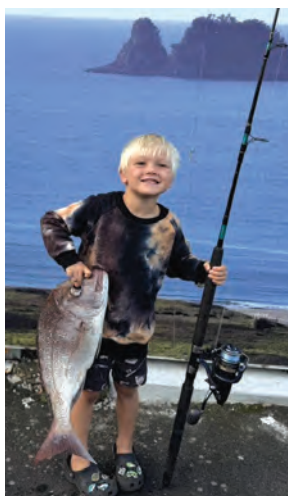
Watch for signs that gamefish are nearby. Diving birds often mark a bait ball. Baitfish skipping across the surface means predators are chasing them. A change in water colour or temperature can be another good clue.

When a fish hits, let it run first. Once it slows, lift the rod into your gimbal belt and use slow steady pumps to bring it in. Communication with your skipper or deckhand is key. When the fish is beside the boat, you can tag and release, gaff, or secure it with a tail rope.

Trolling takes skill, patience, and practice, but once you land that first fish, you'll never forget it.

2026 NZSFC YOUTH NATIONALS' RULES

3-18 APRIL 2026

Please note that no sharks will be weighed in the Youth Nationals.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The New Zealand "Youth Nationals" shall form the arena in which young anglers from throughout New Zealand compete, club against club and angler against angler for the honour of winning various trophies and titles that have been offered for this tournament. The emphasis is on participation and friendly competition within a set of rules.

The 'Council' will determine the rules and conditions that will apply to this tournament.

The 'Council' will determine the dates and hours of fishing the tournament.

In addition to the NZSFC Youth Nationals Tournament Rules and Conditions, the following will also apply:

The NZSFC Fishing Rules and Regulations are incorporated as tournament rules. Only fish caught in accordance with these Fishing Rules and regulations and within the intent of these rules will qualify for the tournament, except as explicitly stated otherwise.

All current New Zealand Laws and Regulations regarding the taking of fish in New Zealand territorial waters.

The New Zealand Sport Fishing Council reserves the right to use any information received by it through results sheets of the **YOUTH NATIONALS TOURNAMENT** for publicity, statistical, or other purposes that may be beneficial to the Council or it's membership.

1. JUDICIAL COMMITTEE

A Judicial Committee will be appointed prior to the tournament starting. The Judicial Committee's decisions shall be final on all matters pertaining to the contest, and any controversy arising over interpretation of these rules. Any dispute relating to the weight of a fish must be lodged with the weighmaster prior to the fish being removed from the weigh station. All other disputes

must be lodged in writing and emailed to the tournament secretary within 48 hours of the tournament ending. The judicial committee may delay the final results if any dispute requires further investigating. Final results will then be announced, with no subsequent protests or disputes being accepted.

2. SAFETY

A Parent/Guardian is responsible for the safety and wellbeing of each entrant and must act in the best interests of the entrants at all times during the tournament to ensure the suitable care and protection of the young people. **A responsible person (such as a skipper) can be delegated to care for entrants – this person must be over the age of 18 and approved by the Parent/Guardian for each entrant.**

Although the Tournament has been arranged for 2 weeks, it is the Guardian and skipper's responsibility to determine that on any one day, the sea conditions and weather forecasts are safe for fishing, including for his/her boat to put to sea or fishing location. The Tournament is being run nationwide and the fact that boats / fishing, may be in one area/region, is not to be taken as an indicator that it is safe to fish in any other area. It is each Guardian / Skipper's responsibility to ensure that the boat they intend to participate in is capable of putting to sea safely, and that any fishing location is safe for the entrants to fish that they are responsible for.

It is the Skipper's responsibility to ensure that the boat carries minimum legal safety equipment and flotation aids, including the requirements of local Coastguard/Harbour Board, or any other local body that has assumed control over the waterways and ocean that the angler intends to fish in.

Each boat must have a reliable means of communication, with the expectation that they can make contact, or be contacted at all times. Each Boat must return to port, or report to their base each day. Any club who is made aware of a Skipper who has put to sea against the advice or directions of one of the authorities named above, or who has not met minimum

safety requirements in equipment must report the matter to the Tournament Secretary, and the Judicial Committee will consider the complaint and can disqualify the angler. Any such disqualification will also disqualify any catches previously weighed by that angler for the Tournament.

Land Based, Kayak, and personal Watercraft anglers will suffer the same penalties if they are found to have ignored advice from officers of surf lifesaving clubs operating in the area.

3. INFRACTIONS

Any person, club, boat skipper or crew, guilty of infraction of the rules could be disqualified from participation in this or any other NZ Sport Fishing Council contest.

4. ELIGIBILITY AND CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

Entrants may or may not be members of an affiliated Club.

All clubs being represented in the Youth Nationals Tournament must be affiliated to, and be financial members of the New Zealand Sport Fishing Council Inc. For the Club to be considered financial their fees must be paid and in the NZSFC account prior to the Tournament commencing.

There are two age categories in this Tournament:

- Primary – **ages 0 - 12 years** (under the age of 13 at the conclusion of the tournament)
- High School – **ages 13 - 17 years** (under the age of 18 at the conclusion of the tournament)

All anglers must have access to a copy of the rules for the Youth Tournament and it is the responsibility of each Angler (and associated caregiver as appropriate) to ensure that rules are followed at all times. Guardians must also help with this as appropriate.

A signed entry form and disclaimer accompanied by the appropriate entry fees must be lodged with the club the angler is fishing for, before an entry is valid.

5. REGISTRATION

A registration fee of \$5 per angler (inclusive of GST) for affiliated members (and non-members entering with affiliated members), must accompany **the official entry form and be paid to the club the angler is representing.**

All anglers must register **at the headquarters of the club they are going to represent** in the tournament. Correct registration is the angler's responsibility.

All anglers must be registered, and registration fees paid **before** they commence fishing. New anglers can register after the tournament has started but registrations must be completed, and registration fees paid, and the Tournament Secretary notified **before** they commence fishing.

6. CLUB RESPONSIBILITIES

All participating clubs must have a nominated recorder, who will be the official contact for the Tournament Secretary for all matters relating to the tournament.

For the 2023 Youth Nationals the preferred method of receiving and transmitting results will be by email. Council would expect all clubs to make a serious attempt to comply with this preference.

All participating clubs must have an email address to receive and transmit results and other information between the club and tournament secretary.

All catches must be relayed to the tournament secretary within 48 hours of the catch. A day being 5 pm to 5 pm (see rule 9).

Daily catch results must be transmitted to the Tournament Secretary not later than 5.00 pm each day and be certified as true and correct. (Certifying will eliminate the need to send catch certificates in) **Nil returns are just as important as positive returns!**

Final catch results must reach the Tournament Secretary prior to 8 pm on the last fishing day of the tournament. The results for the last day will be sent as the last day results but Recorders and Anglers will have 24 hours to check that all fish have been entered and recorded correctly (by 8pm the following day).

Tagged fish must be reported as soon as possible after the fish has been tagged but must not be notified to the Tournament Secretary until such times as the card has been sighted electronically or physically by the Club the angler is fishing for unless prior arrangements have been made. All tagged fish must be reported by the club to NZSFC by 8 pm on the final day.

All affiliated clubs must provide courtesy weighing and email reporting to all anglers fishing in the tournament in line with Rule 13.

Clubs who have anglers fishing away from their home base should make every effort to make sure they are aware of their obligations under Rule 13.

Clubs must provide competent weighmasters to officiate during the clubs weighing times.

Clubs should hold a pre-tournament briefing to make anglers and skippers aware of their responsibilities as regards all aspects of the tournament – Local Coastguard/Harbour rules, radio frequencies and weigh station times.

Clubs must have available copies of the Council booklet for Skippers / anglers to purchase or copies of the rules so there is no excuse for anglers to be ignorant of the rules.

In the case of land-based anglers, at any one time, all members of the group who are fishing together must, be on a stretch of uninterrupted foreshore, must be in sight of a parent/guardian or responsible person, and without the use of aids, be close enough together to be able to call to one another.

In the case of Kayak and Watercraft anglers, They must have all prescribed safety equipment deemed appropriate for Kayak and Watercraft users, and be supervised by the Parent/Guardian or responsible person over the age of 18.

Fish should be weighed from the boat they were caught from, whether on their boat trailer or in the water. Fish can't be transferred to another boat any time for the purpose of weighing the catch except in exceptional circumstances. For safety reasons only, a fish maybe transferred to take to a weigh station as long as the boat on which the fish is caught is

in sight of weigh station, or within one nautical mile of the weigh station. The only other exceptions are if the angler(s) are changing boat because of availability, or in an emergency i.e. a breakdown.

It is the angler's responsibility to make themselves familiar with the rules.

Anglers must nominate a responsible person **over the age of 18 years** on the registration form who is responsible for their care and wellbeing.

7. ANGLERS

Anglers nominate a Club that they are representing and cannot change Clubs they represent during the Tournament once registered.

There must not be less than two people on the boat/shore at any one time and in the interests of safety at least one person should be over the age of 18 years – this person must be a responsible person for the care and safety of the anglers with them.

8. FISHING DAYS AND TIMES

The tournament will run for 16 days (Due to Easter Friday being included), finishing on the last Saturday of the April School Holidays. Anglers can start fishing at 6 am on the first day. All catch cards must be sighted by a weighmaster or recorder by **4 pm** on the final day.

Daily results will be first published on the Monday after the start of the competition and going forward every 48 hours until the end of the competition.

There is "no lines out of the water" time, an angler may fish until such time as they believe that if they land a fish they can have their catch card for weighed fish sighted by a weighmaster of the club weighing the fish **by 4pm** on the final day. There is no playing out of fish after **4pm** on the final day. All fish must be reported to NZSFC by the Club the angler is fishing for by 8 pm on the final day.

9. AREA

The tournament will be fished in that area of water bounded by a line 200 miles from New Zealand's two main islands. The provisions of Rule 14 reporting of catches, Rule 11 Weighing, and Rule 2 Safety, must be adhered to.

10. WEIGH STATION AND EQUIPMENT

All fish must be caught on rod and reel only (handlines are permitted only for the catching of bait). All fish must be weighed in the line class of the line manufacturers rating of the line used, noting that for Section B and C 'All Tackle', there are no line classes. **Where no line class is recorded, it will be assumed to meet the requirements of 'All tackle' and only be eligible in Section B and D. For all other sections, all tackle must comply with NZSFC Fishing Rules and Regulations.** Only non-offset circle hooks can be used targeting Billfish when using live and dead natural baits.

All fish must be weighed, or Tag cards presented at the official weigh stations for the tournament i.e. weigh stations are as listed in the front of the NZSFC yearbook, plus any others notified to and accepted by the tournament secretary prior to the tournament.

All tackle and equipment used in the capture of the fish shall be presented to the weighmaster for inspection. The timing of the presentation/ inspection is dependent on if the fish is weighed or Tagged (refer below to Section 10a and 10b). In the event that any of the tackle or equipment is incomplete or cannot be presented to the weighmaster, **(exception - please see note in 10b Tag & Release regarding hooks cut free)** the catch will be deemed incomplete, and the fish will not qualify for the tournament.

Any matters where the weighmaster cannot make a final decision on, they are to notify the tournament secretary in writing within 24 hours explaining the situation, so the judicial committee can make a final call on the eligibility of the catch for the tournament.

10a. Weighing

All fish must be weighed within 36 hours of being caught.

All tackle and equipment used in the capture of the fish shall be presented to the weighmaster for inspection at the time of weighing.

Weighmasters have the right to inspect any gear on the boat at any time of weighing.

10b. Tag and Release (T & R)

Tag cards must be sighted either physically or electronically by the Club the angler is fishing for, within 36 hours of being tagged, noting that the closing time for all submissions is 4 pm on the final day.

All tackle and equipment used in the capture of a T & R fish **MUST** be presented to a weighmaster or IGFA Rep for inspection when the hardcopy Tag card is submitted.

For all Billfish and Sharks - in the event the hook cannot be safely removed or in the best interests of fish welfare, it is acceptable to cut the leader as close as practically possible to the hook and release the fish, the trace must still be presented to the weighmaster for inspection / measuring along with all other tackle and equipment.

All Tag cards must be accompanied by photographic evidence of the Tag clearly inserted into the caught fish. This may be a still photo or video. Failure to provide photographic evidence which confirms the placement of the Tag and species of the fish will result in the tagged fish being removed from the tournament.

Where Tags have been submitted electronically, the original Hardcopy card must be submitted (including equipment inspection) within 24 hours of the tournament ending. Failure to hand in any tag card within this timeframe will result in the tagged fish being removed from the tournament.

11. FORMULA BASIS

The formula is the weight of the fish times 100 divided by the line weight for weighed fish.

Tagged and released points are as follows:

- **Blue & Black Marlin, Broadbill & Striped Marlin** - 600 points
- **Spearfish** - 100 points
- **Shark** - 100 points
- **Tuna (yellowfin, bluefin, bigeye, butterfly)** - 150 points
- **Yellowtail** - 25 points

These tag and release points are regardless of line weight (but must be within the line weights referred to in 15 (Species Section 1).

Points are gained by:

For Blue & Black Marlin, Broadbill, Striped Marlin, Shortbill Spearfish, Tuna, Shark and Yellowtail **all tagged fish will score points along with the top 3 scoring fish weighed, excluding sharks. Only the top 3 scoring Mahimahi, Albacore, (Skipjack, & Slender Tuna combined), Snapper, Kahawai, Trevally, Gurnard and Blue Cod will count in their sections.**

12. COURTESY WEIGHING

All clubs must provide courtesy weighs for all anglers fishing the Youth Nationals. They must also provide recording and reporting of catches to the angler. It is the Angler's responsibility to ensure that the copy of the weighsheet is submitted to the club that they are fishing for. (The general rule should be that visiting anglers should have available to them, the same hours of weighing and reporting services, as a local angler).

All participating anglers wishing to use the courtesy weigh facility of another club must abide by the rules and conditions for weighing at the host club as though they were a member of that club. **It is the visiting anglers' responsibility to ensure that they are familiar with any such rules and conditions.**

ALL PARTICIPATING ANGLERS WISHING TO USE THE COURTESY WEIGH FACILITY OF ANOTHER CLUB MUST INFORM THE HOST CLUB AS SOON AS SUCH A REQUIREMENT BECOMES APPARENT.

Any anglers intending fishing away from their home base and intending to use courtesy weigh facilities must inform prospective hosts in advance and make their intentions known.

Weigh sheets used for courtesy weighing must be from the club providing the courtesy weigh. Two forms must be filled in, prior to weighing of the fish. One weigh sheet is for the club providing the courtesy weigh, and the other is for the angler to take back to their club for their records. This is the angler's responsibility.

If the words > courtesy, consideration, and common sense < are kept to the fore courtesy weighing should not present a problem

13. REPORTING OF CATCHES

All fish (Species Section 1 only) must be reported as soon as possible after being boated, to the weigh station or club where the fish is expected to be weighed, giving the following details: Angler, Species and the time boated.

All fish tagged and released must be reported as soon as possible after the release but must not be reported to the Tournament Secretary until such time as the tag card has been sighted either physically or electronically by the club the angler is fishing for. Please refer to rule 11b Tag & Release for final handing in of tag cards and tackle and equipment checking for tag & released fish.

15. CATCH RESTRICTIONS

Each angler can weigh a maximum of 3 fish per species per day for the Tournament apart from Sharks. The 3 fish restriction applies to Length for Points fish also.

Minimum weights and lengths for fish in all sections are:

Weighed - Must equal or exceed 90 kg

Tag & Release - No minimum

Broadbill

Weighed - Must equal or exceed 90 kg

Tag & Release - No minimum

Striped Marlin

Weighed - Must equal or exceed 90 kg

Tag & Release - No minimum

Shortbill Spearfish

Weighed - Must equal or exceed 10 kg

Tag & Release - No Minimum

Mahimahi

Weighed - Must equal or exceed 4 kg on line weights 15kg and above. On line/tippet weights 10 kg and below there is no minimum fish weight

No Tag & Release

Shark (all species as listed under 15. Species)

Only 1 shark per angler per day may be weighed

Tag & Release - 122 cm or 4 feet

Tuna - Bluefin, Bigeye and Butterfly

Weighed - Must equal or exceed line/tippet weight

Tag & Release - No minimum

Yellowfin Tuna

Weighed - Minimum weight is 15 kg online 15 kg and above. On line weights 10 kg and below the fish must equal or exceed the line weight

Tag and Release - No minimum

Yellowtail

Weighed - 75 cm in length or greater

Tag & Release - 75 cm in length or greater

Albacore, Snapper, Kahawai, Skipjack & Slender, Trevally, Gurnard and Blue Cod

(No Tag and Release)

Minimum MPI legal length (where applicable)

Note: Shark (All Species as listed) – Tagged – 122 cm or 4 ft (it is not intended that anglers or crew should risk injury trying to measure sharks to the millimetre but should use the best possible estimate using any practical aid eg a mark on a gaff handle or length of cord).

SECTION A

Champion New Zealand Youth Anglers – Individual Anglers

The most meritorious catch on the formula basis for **a fish scoring the highest points.**

This is for weighed fish only, tagged fish not included. (15 Champions for each age category). IGFA Line Classes Apply.

SECTION B

NZ Champion Heaviest Fish Youth Angler – Weighed Fish

The winner will be the angler with the **heaviest single fish for each of the fish species.** (15 Champions for each age category).

SECTION C

Overall Champion Angler

There will be 1 Champion Angler (One for each Age Category).

The winning angler will be the angler scoring the **highest aggregate number of points from the scoring fish from each of the fifteen species (maximum 15 fish, 1 per species) – NZ Wide. Tagged fish included** IGFA Line Classes Apply.

SECTION D

Length Section

The winner will be the angler with the longest fish in each of the following species:

Albacore, Kahawai, Snapper, Skipjack, Trevally, Yellowtail, Gurnard and Blue Cod

- Fish in this section will remain in this section only
- Fish must be released so they can't be kept and weighed in for another section in the Youth Nationals Any fish that qualifies as a NZ Record will be added to the NZ Record section.
- (8 Champions for each age category)

SECTION E

Tag And Release Section

The winner will be the angler tagging and releasing **the most fish in each of the seven species sections**, namely Blue & Black Marlin, Broadbill, Striped Marlin, Shortbill Spearfish, Shark, Yellowtail & Tuna. (7 Champions for each age category). In the event of more than one angler tagging and releasing the same number of fish, the winner will be the angler who tagged his last fish first. IGFA Line Classes Apply.

Only fish tagged with the Council approved tags will count.

Released fish not tagged do not count.

SECTION F

Top Club - Interclub Competition

An Interclub competition is to be held in conjunction with the tournament. The following rules relate to the Interclub:

There will be 1 Interclub Champion and age categories are merged into one.

The winning club will be the club scoring **the highest aggregate number of points from the scoring fish from each club for each of the fifteen species (maximum 15 fish, 1 per species)**. IGFA Line Classes Apply.

SECTION G

Club Champion Angler

There will be 1 Champion Angler per club (One for each Age Category).

The winning angler will be the angler scoring **the highest aggregate number of points from the scoring fish for each of the fifteen species (maximum 15 fish, 1 per species) within each Club**. IGFA Line Classes Apply.

SECTION H

Fun Or Funny Photo

Best still photo or video taken by or with an entered angler included during the tournament showing fun or a funny moment. (One for each Age Category). Entries to be submitted by the NZSFC application. If the app is not available, then to secretary@nzsportfishing.org.nz and judged by the panel of judges.

SECTION I

Marine Photo

Best Marine still photo or video taken by an entered angler during the tournament. Photos to include the marine environment. (One for each Age Category). Entries to be submitted by the NZSFC application. If the app is not available, then to secretary@nzsportfishing.org.nz and judged by the panel of judges.

Where an angler has not used equipment that is in accordance with NZSFC Rules and Regulations **(such as an undetermined line class or non-conforming leader/hook configuration)** then fish weighed will remain eligible for Section B (Heaviest Fish) and Section D (Length) (only). The Youth Nationals are intended to encourage participation.

All other fish sections (Sections A, C, E, F and G) **MUST** follow NZSFC Rules and Regulations.

NOTES FOR RECORDERS

NUMBER ONE RULE: PLEASE READ THE RULES

1. All Clubs must appoint a Recorder who is willing to check the results each evening – especially those clubs with anglers fishing away from home
2. Please remember that **Anglers must register with the Club they will represent.** If they intend to fish from another location/ Club they must still register with their club they intend to represent.
3. The Angler Details sheet needs to be emailed to the Tournament Secretary as soon as details are to hand.
Results must be sent within 48 hours of the fish being weighed. Results for Tagged fish should be sent when the card has been sighted either electronically or physically within 36 hours by the Club the angler is fishing for unless prior arrangements have been made.
4. The Results Schedule needs to be emailed to the Tournament Secretary prior to 5 pm. All fish weighed, and tag cards sighted (physically or electronically) that day must be written on this sheet. Results after 5 pm will go into the next day's tally (except on the final night of course). **A 'Nil' return by phone or email speeds up the results – very necessary on the final night.**
5. Result Sheets are certified correct by the Recorder; it is therefore important that the Recorders check all results as they come out each night. **All Tag cards must be sighted by the Club the angler is fishing for and reported only when they have been sighted either physically or electronically.**
6. Anglers can join the Tournament at any stage during the contest. Please ensure the 'extras' are emailed to the Tournament Secretary on a Details Sheet.
7. To make life simple if you have any further entries, or other queries it would be appreciated if these were dealt with during the day to leave the evening free for results to be processed.
8. Once the tournament has ended, each club will be invoiced based on their number of entries. This payment is to be forwarded to the Secretary, NZSFC, PO Box 54242, The Marina, Half Moon Bay, Auckland 2144, or paid by direct payment to NZSFC bank account as soon as possible after the club has received an invoice from the Secretary
9. Recorders and Anglers have 24 hours after the Tournament finishes to check that all their fish have been entered and are correct.

NZSFC RULES & REGULATIONS

SECTION 1: INTRODUCTION

1.1 Understanding this document

This document contains the Angling Rules and Regulations for the New Zealand Sportfishing Council (NZSFC).

The basis of the rules is the International Game Fish Association International (IGFA) Angling Rules, which are set by IGFA. Where IGFA updates any rule, then that rule automatically supersedes the IGFA sourced wording within this document.

Within Section 2 of this document, the wording sourced from the IGFA Rules is shown as black text. NZSFC additions are shown in Section 2 are in red text. The combination of the two for NZSFC rules and regulations. Any angler wishing to fish strictly by IGFA rules only should refer to that set of rules (only).

NZSFC promotes Tagging and Releasing of Gamefish, and a number of additional NZSFC rules are applied to address this including the definition of when a fish is caught. There are also other NZSFC rules and regulations added to this document that relate to New Zealand specifically, including alignment with NZ angling practices and fisheries management. These rules can only be amended at the NZSFC Annual General Meeting following constitutional requirements.

1.2 Records

There are records kept by IGFA (internationally), NZSFC and NZACA (NZ only). This document includes the IGFA rules. A full list of the IGFA record categories and requirements is available from IGFA.

This document includes a complete list of requirements/categories for NZSFC Records. NZSFC maintains NZ records for all NZ Anglers. Information regarding process and fees payable are included in Section 2.

1.3 NZSFC awards and trophies

NZSFC provide awards and trophies for members of NZSFC affiliated clubs.

This includes day members.

1.4 General

As these IGFA fishing regulations are for world record claims, these rules have been extended by the NZSFC for better understanding to enable them to be more suited for club trophies and tournaments. Any club who is considering running a fishing tournament with high value prizes should extend these fishing rules further to cover any circumstances pertaining to their club and sponsors requirements.

These fishing rules and regulations must be used for NZSFC National Record Claims. These fishing rules and regulations must be used in the Annual NZSFC National Fishing Tournament.

Any Club or organization using these Rules and Regulations do so at their own risk. The NZSFC does not accept any responsibility in the use of these rules and regulations in any other Tournaments.

SECTION 2: IGFA RULES INCLUDING NZSFC ADDITIONS

Note: In section 2 – Black Text are IGFA sourced Rules, NZSFC additions are shown in Red Text.

The following angling rules have been formulated by the International Game Fish Association (IGFA) to promote ethical and sporting angling practices, to establish uniform regulations for the compilation of world game fish records, and to provide basic angling guidelines for use in fishing tournaments and any other group angling activities.

The word “angling” is defined as catching or attempting to catch fish with a rod, reel, line, and hook as outlined in the IGFA International Angling Rules. There are some aspects of angling that cannot be controlled through rule making, how-ever. Angling regulations cannot insure an outstanding performance from each fish, and world records cannot indicate the amount of difficulty in catching the fish. Captures in which the fish has not fought or has not had a chance to fight do not reflect credit on the fisherman, and only the angler can properly evaluate the degree of achievement in establishing the record.

Only fish caught in accordance with IGFA International Angling Rules, and within the intent of these rules, will be considered for world records. Following are the rules for freshwater and saltwater fishing and a separate set of rules for All-Tackle Length and fly fishing.

Rules for fishing in freshwater and saltwater

(Also see Rules for Fly-fishing)

Equipment Regulations

A. Line and backing

1. Monofilament, multifilament, and lead core multifilament lines may be used. For line classes, see World Record Requirements.
2. Wire lines are prohibited.
3. The use of backing is permissible.
4. The catch shall be classified under the breaking strength of the first 16.5 feet (5 meters) of line directly preceding the double line, leader, or hook. This section must be comprised of a single, homogeneous piece of line and may not exceed 60 kilogram (130 pound) line class.

B. Double line

The use of a double line is not required. If one is used, it must meet the following specifications:

1. A double line must consist of the actual line used to catch the fish.
2. Double lines are measured from the start of the knot, braid, roll or splice making the double to the farthestmost end of the knot, splice, snap, swivel or other device used for securing the trace, leader, lure or hook to the double line.

Saltwater species: In all line classes up to and including 10 kilograms (20 pounds), the double line shall be limited to 4.57 meters (15 feet). The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 6.1 meters (20 feet). The double line on all classes of tackle over 10 kilograms (20 pounds) shall be limited to 9.14 meters (30 feet). The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 12.19 meters (40 feet).

Freshwater species: The double line on all classes of tackle shall not exceed 6 feet (1.82 meters). The combined length of the double line

and the leader shall not exceed 10 feet (3.04 meters).

C. Leader

If a leader is used, it must meet the following specifications: The length of the leader is the overall length including any lure, hook arrangement or other device, and is measured to the bend of the last hook. The leader must be connected to the line with a snap, knot, splice, swivel or other device. Holding devices are prohibited. There are no regulations regarding the material or strength of the leader.

Saltwater species: In all line classes up to and including 10 kilograms (20 pounds), the leader shall be limited to 4.57 meters (15 feet). The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 6.1 meters (20 feet). The leader on all classes of tackle over 10 kilograms (20 pounds) shall be limited to 9.14 meters (30 feet). The combined length of the double line and leader shall be limited to 12.19 meters (40 feet).

Freshwater species: The leader on all classes of tackle shall be limited to 1.82 meters (6 feet). The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 3.04 meters (10 feet).

D. Rod

1. Rods must comply with sporting ethics and customs. Considerable latitude is allowed in the choice of a rod, but rods giving the angler an unfair advantage will be disqualified. This rule is intended to eliminate the use of unconventional rods.
2. The rod tip must be a minimum of 101.6 centimeters (40 inches) in length. The rod butt cannot exceed 68.58 centimeters (27 inches) in length. These measurements must be made from a point directly beneath the center of the reel. A curved butt is measured in a straight line. When the rod butt is placed in a gimbal, the measurement from the center of the reel seat to the pivot point of the gimbal can be no more than 68.58 centimeters (27 inches). (The above measurements do not apply to surfcasting rods.)

E. Reel

1. Reels must comply with sporting ethics and customs.

2. Power driven reels of any kind are prohibited. This includes motor, hydraulic, or electrically driven reels, and any device, which gives the angler an unfair advantage.
3. Ratchet handle reels are prohibited.
4. Reels designed to be cranked with both hands at the same time are prohibited.

F. Hooks for bait fishing

1. For live or dead bait fishing no more than two single hooks may be used. Both must be firmly embedded in or securely attached to the bait. The eyes of the hooks must be no less than a hook's length (the length of the largest hook used) apart and no more than 45.72 centimeters (18 inches) apart. The only exception is that the point of one hook may be passed through the eye of the other hook. A hook may not precede bait, lure or bait/lure combo by more than one hook's length.
2. The use of a dangling or swinging hook is prohibited. Double or treble hooks are prohibited.
3. A two-hook rig for bottom fishing is acceptable if it consists of two single hooks on separate leaders or drops. Both hooks must be embedded in the respective baits and separated sufficiently so that a fish caught on one hook cannot be foul-hooked by the other.
4. A photograph or sketch of the hook arrangement must accompany all record applications made for fish caught on two-hook tackle.

G. Hooks and lures

1. When using an artificial lure with a skirt or trailing material, no more than two single hooks may be attached to the line, leader, or trace. The hooks need not be attached separately. The eyes of the hooks must be no less than an overall hook's length (the overall length of the largest hook used) apart and no more than 12 inches (30.48 cm) apart. The only exception is that the point of one hook may be passed through the eye of the other hook. The trailing hook may not extend more than a hook's length beyond the skirt of the lure. A hook may not precede bait, lure or bait/lure combo by

more than one hook's length. A photograph or sketch showing the hook arrangement must accompany a record application.

2. Gang hooks are permitted when attached to plugs and other artificial lures that are specifically designed for this use. Gang hooks must be free swinging and shall be limited to a maximum of three hooks (single, double, or treble, or a combination of any three). Baits may not be used with gang hooks. A photograph or sketch of the plug or lure must be submitted with record applications.
3. Assist hooks or other such single hooks that are attached to a lure with a lead constructed of monofilament, multifilament, wire or other such material must conform to the following: When using assist hooks on any artificial lure, other than a skirted lure, the lead cannot be more than 1 ½ hook's length and the bend of the hook may not be more than 4 inches (101mm) whichever is less, from the closest point of attachment on the lure. Double and treble hooks may not be used as assist hooks.
4. Only one lure containing hooks may be used at a time.

H. Other equipment

1. **Fighting chairs** may not have any mechanically propelled devices that aid the angler in fighting a fish.
2. **Gimbals** must be free swinging, which includes gimbals that swing in a vertical plane only. Any gimbal that allows the angler to reduce strain or to rest while fighting the fish is prohibited.
3. **Gaffs** and nets used to boat or land a fish must not exceed 8 feet (2.44 meters) in overall length. In using a flying or detachable gaff the rope may not exceed 30 feet (9.14 meters). The gaff rope must be measured from the point where it is secured to the detachable head to the other end. Only the effective length will be considered. If a fixed head gaff is used, the same limitations shall apply and the gaff rope shall be measured from the same location on the gaff hook. Only a single hook is permitted on any gaff. **Choke ropes must not exceed 30 ft (9.14 meters) including the**

wire or chain on one end. Harpoon or lance attachments are prohibited. Tail ropes are limited to 30 feet (9.14 meters). (Once the catch is alongside and under control and the crew are unable to lift the fish on board, an anchor rope or block and tackle may be attached to the tail or gaff rope to bring the catch on board as long as the crew can verify it was not used in the fight of the fish). (When fishing from a bridge, pier or other high platform or structure, this length limitation does not apply).

4. **Entangling devices**, either with or without a hook, are prohibited and may not be used for any purpose including baiting, hooking, fighting or landing the fish.
5. **Outriggers, down riggers, spreader bars and kites** are permitted to be used provided that the actual fishing line is attached to the snap or other release device, either directly or with some other material. The leader or double line may not be connected to the release mechanism either directly or with the use of a connecting device. Spreader bars are also acceptable when used strictly as a teaser.
6. **Daisy chains, birds, floats and similar devices** may only be used if they do not unfairly hamper or inhibit the normal swimming or fighting ability of the fish, thereby giving the angler or crew an unfair advantage in fighting, landing or boating the fish.
7. **A safety line** may be attached to the rod, reel or harness provided that it does not in any way assist the angler in fighting the fish.
8. **Tag poles** must not exceed 12 feet (3.66 meters) in length.

Angling regulations

1. From the time that a fish strikes or takes a bait or lure, the angler must hook, fight, and land or boat the fish without the aid of any other person, except as provided in these regulations.
2. If a rod holder is used once the fish is hooked, the angler must remove the rod from the holder as quickly as possible.
3. In the event of a multiple strike on separate lines being fished by a single angler, only

the first fish fought by the angler will be considered for a world record.

4. If a double line is used, the intent of the regulations is that the fish will be fought on the single line most of the time that it takes to land the fish.
5. A harness may be attached to the reel or rod, but not to the fighting chair. The harness may be replaced or adjusted by a person other than the angler.
6. Use of a rod belt or waist gimmel is permitted.
7. When angling from a boat, once the leader is brought within the grasp of the mate, or the end of the leader is wound to the rod tip, more than one person is permitted to hold the leader. Anyone assisting a shore-bound or wading angler must be within a rods length of the angler before touching the leader or netting or gaffing the fish.
8. One or more gaffers may be used in addition to persons holding the leader. The gaff handle must be in hand when the fish is gaffed.
9. The angling and equipment regulations shall apply until the fish is weighed.
10. In the event of an angler wishing to re-use a successful lure on the same day, the leader must be cut on a 45 degree angle at the swivel top or loop end. Both pieces together with the re-rigged lure must be presented to the weighmaster or judge that day.
11. Any catch will not be deemed to be complete until after the catch is weighed. In the event of a fish being tagged, the catch will be deemed complete when the tag is inserted in the fish. Subject to verification of weighing or releasing requirements.
12. When tagging a fish, the tag pole must be held at all times.
13. Only fish tagged with tags supplied or approved by Council will be recognised. Fish are tagged for the purpose of research.
14. Tag cards should be handed into weighmasters as soon as possible after the fish are tagged.
15. Any fish tagged while still in the water should be alongside the boat and under control so the tag can be placed correctly.

16. The council strongly recommends that non off-set circle hooks be used when live baiting for any species. This will give fish a better chance of survival when tagged & released.

Definition of When a Fish is Caught:

1. When landing or boating a fish the leader, if used, should be in hand before it is gaffed.
2. Time of Capture – For the purposes of competitions or awards, time of capture shall be when the fish is boated or landed (weighed fish) or is successfully tagged and released or released.
- 2a. The catch will not be confirmed as caught until the fish is weighed or the tag card is presented. The intention is that all angling regulations & rules, including equipment used, to entice, hook, fight, land and secure the catch must comply with all IGFA International Angling rules & NZSFC fishing rules until the fish has been weighed or tagged and released. Once a fish is gaffed it cannot be tagged and released.
3. In the event of a fish being tagged for releasing the leader should be in hand when the tag is inserted into the fish. When the tag is inserted the catch is deemed complete. The leader then can be intentionally cut as close to the fish as possible, or the hooks removed, or the fish releases itself.
4. In the event of a fish being released without tagging the fish is deemed caught and released when the leader is in hand and the leader is intentionally cut as close to the fish as possible, or the hook is removed.
5. A fish that has been tagged and the leader in hand still uncut and attached to the fish, maybe gaffed and weighed if the angler considers that it is unlikely to survive or for any other reason. The tag must remain in the fish until it is weighed and then removed and returned to the tag card.
6. When fly fishing it is not necessary to have the leader in hand and when a fish is released without tagging the fish should be within tagging or gaffing distance when released.

The following acts will disqualify a catch:

1. Failure to comply with equipment or angling regulations.
2. The act of persons other than the angler in touching any part of the rod, reel, or line (including the double line) either bodily or with any device, from the time a fish strikes or takes the bait or lure, until the fish is either landed or released, or in giving any aid other than that allowed in the rules and regulations. If an obstacle to the passage of the line through the rod guides has to be removed from the line, then the obstacle (whether chum, float line, rubber band, or other material) shall be held and cut free. Under no circumstances should the line be held or touched by anyone other than the angler during this process.
3. **Returning the rod to the rod holder**, resting the rod in a rod holder, on the gunwale of the boat, or any other object while playing the fish. **The rod being passed to the angler after the fish has taken the bait or lure.**
4. Handlining or using a handline or rope attached in any manner to the angler's line or leader for the purpose of holding or lifting the fish.
5. Shooting, harpooning, or lancing any fish (including sharks and halibuts) at any stage of the catch.
6. Chumming with or using as bait the flesh, blood, skin or any part of mammals other than hair or pork rind used in lures designed for trolling or casting.
7. Using a boat or device to beach or drive a fish into shallow water in order to deprive the fish of its normal ability to swim.
8. Changing the rod or reel while the fish is being played.
9. Splicing, removing, or adding to the line while the fish is being played.
10. Intentionally foul-hooking a fish.
11. Catching a fish in a manner that the double line never leaves the rod tip.
12. Using a size or kind of bait that is illegal to possess.
13. Attaching the angler's line or leader to part of a boat or other object for the purpose of holding or lifting the fish.

14. If a fish escapes before gaffing, or netting, and is recaptured by any method other than as outlined in the angling rules.
15. Holding or touching an angler in a manner that assists them in fighting the fish or takes pressure off the angler. Touching or briefly holding the angler to prevent them from falling does not constitute a disqualification.
16. When live baiting and the deckhand or any other person other than the angler is holding the rod when the fish takes the bait.
17. If a fish escapes before gaffing, netting, tagging, or deliberately releasing it, it will be considered a free swimming fish and will not be regarded as a catch.
18. That any marlin or shark intentionally taken out of the water to be Tagged and released will be disqualified.
19. If the tag pole is used in a manner of a Harpoon, when tagging a fish or when it leaves the hand.

The following situations will disqualify a catch:

1. When a rod breaks (while the fish is being played) in a manner that reduces the length of the tip below minimum dimensions or severely impairs its angling characteristics.
2. Mutilation to the fish, prior to landing or boating the catch, caused by sharks, other fish, mammals, or propellers that remove or penetrate the flesh. (Injuries caused by leader or line, scratches, old healed scars or regeneration deformities are not considered to be disqualifying injuries). Any mutilation on the fish must be shown in a photograph and fully explained in a separate report accompanying the record application.
3. When a fish is hooked or entangled on more than one line.
4. When a catch violates laws or regulations governing the species or the waters where it was caught.

NZSFC/IGFA World Record Requirements

Game fish catches can only be considered for record status if they are caught according to the IGFA/NZSFC Angling Rules. Following is information on world record categories, requirements and procedures for filing claims.

All materials submitted as part of the application process become the property of IGFA.

World and NZ Record Categories

General Information

IGFA maintains world records for both freshwater and saltwater game fish in All-Tackle, All-Tackle Length, Line Class, Tippet Class and Junior and Smallfry categories. In order to qualify for a record, a catch must be a minimum of .453 kg. (1 lb.) in weight, and must outweigh the existing record by the required amount or meet the minimum weight requirement for vacant records.

No applications will be accepted for fish caught in hatchery waters, sanctuaries or small bodies of water that are stocked with fish for commercial purposes. The intent of this rule shall prevail and IGFA retains the right to determine its applicability on a case by case basis. The catch must not be at variance with any laws or regulations governing recreational catch or harvest of the species or waters in which it is caught.

When an additional species of game fish is made eligible for IGFA All-Tackle Length, Line Class, Tippet Class, Junior or Smallfry world records, the effective date will be announced by the IGFA. Fish caught on or after the effective date will be eligible for records. Announcement of an additional species in the World Record Game Fishes book or in other IGFA communications will be considered proper notification in lieu of any other notice.

If an angler submits more than one application for the same record, caught on the same day, only the heaviest or longest of the fish will be accepted.

If claiming a World Record, fees apply – it will automatically become a New Zealand record once ratified as a World Record. For Junior & Smallfry Records the lines need to be tested for NZ Records – just as long as it is caught on a line class that IGFA allows for the species and line weight used. IGFA have no line classes for Junior & Smallfry Records.

Where the current NZSFC recognized Line class exceeds the current IGFA line class, then that record shall stand for ongoing competition.

Fish species recognised by nzsf:

The NZSFC recognises all species of fish that IGFA recognise that can be caught in NZ waters, all line class species selected will be published in our yearbook, and all other species will be published on our website.

All-Tackle

All-Tackle World Records are kept for the heaviest fish of a species caught by an angler in any Line Class up to 60kilogram (130 lb). All-Tackle record claims are considered for all species of fish caught according to the IGFA International Angling Rules.

Applications for All-Tackle species not currently included in the IGFA Line Class and Tippet Class listings must meet the following criteria:

- 1. The fish must represent a valid species with a recognized scientific name.
- 2. The fish must be identifiable based on photos and other supporting data presented with the application.
- 3. The fish must be considered “trophy sized.” A rule of thumb is that the weight must fall within the top half of the maximum reported weight for the species. If no maximum weight is available, it must fall within the top half of the maximum reported length for the species. Maximum reported weight and length for species may be found at www.fishbase.org or from other reputable sources.

All-Tackle Length

All-Tackle Length World Records are kept for the longest fish of each eligible species caught according to the IGFA International Angling Rules in any Line Class up to 60 kg. (130 lb.) and released alive.

National length records

Any measuring devices approved by the NZSFC can be used. Any board other than the IGFA Board will not be allowed for World Records. There are only 5 species that IGFA currently recognise and they are albacore, kahawai, snapper, skipjack tuna and yellowtail kingfish.

Trevally, John Dory & Blue Cod are added for NZ purposes, plus any other species that the NZSFC so nominate from time to time.

Junior

Junior World Records are kept for the heaviest fish of each eligible species in any Line Class up

to 60 kg. (130 lb.). Junior records are kept for both male and female anglers ages 11-16. All species recognized for Line Class records and Tippet Class records are also recognized for Junior records. All IGFA International Angling Rules apply, with the exception that fish do not have to be weighed on land.

Smallfry

Smallfry World Records are kept for the heaviest fish of each eligible species in any Line Class up to 60 kg. (130 lb.). Smallfry records are kept for both male and female anglers ages 10 and under. All species recognized for Line Class records and Tippet Class records are also recognized for Smallfry records. All IGFA International Angling Rules apply, with the exception that fish do not have to be weighed on land.

Line Class

Line Class world records are kept for each eligible species according to the breaking strength of the first 5 meters (16.5 feet) of line directly preceding the double line, leader or hook. This section must be comprised of a single, homogeneous piece of line. For all Line Class records, the weight of the fish must be at least ½ of the Line Class used to make the catch

Tippet Class

Tippet Class world records are kept for the eligible species according to the breaking strength of the class tippet. For all Tippet Class records, the weight of the fish must be at least ½ of the Tippet Class used to make the catch. World records are kept in the following Line and Tippet classes:

Line Testing

The IGFA tests all line and tippet samples submitted with world record claims using the metric system, which varies slightly from the imperial measurement system. For example, the imperial measurement system equivalent of 4 kg. is 8.81 lb. Thus, line designated by the manufacturer as 8lb. class line may test up to 8.81 lbs. (4 kg.) to qualify for a 4kg. (8 lb.) Line Class world record. The imperial measurement system equivalents in pounds for the metric Line Classes are as follows:

- Line and tippet samples submitted with record claims are uniformly tested in accordance with IGFA protocols.
- Note: IGFA offers both line and tippet testing service for IGFA members

Record Catch Regulations

General Information

1. Protested applications or disputed existing records will be referred to the IGFA Rules Committee for review. Rules Committee decisions may be appealed to the IGFA Board of Trustees. IGFA reserves the right to refuse to consider an application or grant a claim for a record application. All IGFA decisions will be based upon the intent of the regulations.
2. Any and all claims and/or disputes regarding the IGFA International Angling Rules shall be governed by and construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida without regard to such jurisdiction's conflict of laws principles.

In the event that parties are unable to mutually resolve any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of, in connection with, or in relation to the IGFA International Angling Rules, such dispute, controversy or claim shall be resolved by litigation; in that connection, each of the parties to such dispute hereby:

- (i) irrevocably and unconditionally consents to submit itself to the sole and exclusive personal jurisdiction of any federal or state court located within Broward County, Florida (the "Applicable Courts"),
- (ii) waives any objection to the laying of sole and exclusive venue of any such litigation in any of the Applicable Courts,
- (iii) agrees not to plead or claim in any such court that such litigation brought therein has been brought in an inconvenient forum and agrees not to otherwise attempt to deny or defeat such personal jurisdiction or venue by motion or other request for leave from any such court, and (iv) agrees that it will not bring any action, suit, or proceeding in connection with any dispute, claim or controversy arising out of or relating to the Angling Rules in any court or other tribunal other than any of the Applicable Courts. Nothing in this Section shall prevent enforcement in another forum of any judgment obtained in the Applicable Courts.

In the event that it shall become necessary for any party to take action of any type whatsoever to enforce the terms of the IGFA International Angling Rules, the prevailing Party shall be entitled to recover all its costs, including attorneys' fees, costs, and expenses, including all out of pocket expenses that are not taxable as costs, incurred in connection with any such action, including any negotiations, mediations, arbitrations, litigation, and appeal.

3. The IGFA will not recognize or approve any IGFA World Record application where a financial award is offered for obtaining the record.

NEW ZEALAND RECORD CLAIMS

The Council will keep a Register of National records caught by its anglers.

To qualify for New Zealand record claims:-

1. (a) Fish must be caught in NZSFC waters
(b) All NZSFC fishing rules and angling regulations must be complied with at the time of catch
2. To qualify for New Zealand records, all claims must be in the hands of the NZSFC records officer within sixty (60) days of the catch.
3. New Zealand Sport Fishing Council adopt the IGFA minimum fish weight policy for the qualification of New Zealand record fishes, providing that fish meeting this minimum weight also exceed the minimum size regulations prescribed by the New Zealand Government
4. A sample of the line used must accompany the claim. NZSFC to follow the same line samples requirements as IGFA. The line sample must be supplied in a form that can be easily unrolled for testing without tangling. In regard to Braid or any other IGFA permitted type line, if two lines are attached then both must be submitted for testing.
5. The following photographs are required to accompany the claim:
(a) The full length of the fish, the rod & reel used to make the catch.
(b) The angler photographed with the fish.
(c) In the event of a Big Eye Tuna claim, a photo must also be submitted of the liver of the fish.
(d) A photo of the fish lying on its side with a tape or rule laying alongside the fish.
6. All NZ Record Claims are open to all anglers in NZ. If the angler is not a member of a national body (NZSFC or Angling & Casting) at the time of capture there will be a fee of \$150 for the claim to be processed. If the angler is a non-member the fish will only qualify for a national record and no other trophies.
7. Anglers with disabilities claiming record. Any angler with a disability will contest NZ records as listed. They may due to their

disability make special procedures to enable them to angle a fish safely and mitigate a disability to enable them to fish. They will as far as physically possible fish within NZSFC and IGFA rules. Any departure from these rules is to be noted on the record application and the reason given. The award of the record in this special circumstance will need to pass the records officer requirements and assessment of a special panel of judges appointed from time to time by the Board. The record will be recorded in the appropriate category in the NZ records book

In some instances, an IGFA officer, IGFA representative or a representative from a local IGFA member club may be asked to recheck information supplied on a record application. Such action is not to be regarded as doubt of the formal affidavit, but rather as evidence of the extreme care with which IGFA investigates and maintains its records.

Species Identification

1. Photographs must be submitted by which positive identification of the exact species can be made. Read the photographic requirements at the end of this section. Applications without photographs will not be accepted.
2. If there is the slightest doubt that the fish cannot be properly identified from the photographs and other data submitted, the fish should be examined by an ichthyologist or qualified fishery biologist before a record application is submitted to IGFA. The scientist's signature, title and qualifications should appear on the IGFA record application form or on a separate document confirming the identification of the species.
3. If a scientist is not available, the fish should be retained in a preserved or frozen condition until a qualified authority can verify the species or until notified by IGFA that the fish no longer needs to be retained.
4. If no decision can be made from the photographs and the angler can provide no further proof of the identification of the species, the record claim will not be considered.

Witnesses to Catch

On all record claims, witnesses to the catch are highly desirable. It is important that the witnesses can attest to the angler's compliance with the IGFA International Angling Rules and Equipment Regulations.

Minimum Weight Requirements

For all Line Class and Tippet Class categories, the catch must weigh at least $\frac{1}{2}$ as much as the Line Class or Tippet Class. For example, a fish entered for the 6 kg. (12 lb.) Line Class or Tippet Class category must weigh a minimum of 2.72 kg. (6 lb.).

Weights needed to defeat or tie records

1. To replace a record for a fish weighing less than 11.33 kg. (25 lb.), the replacement must weigh at least 56.69 grams (2 ounces) more than the existing record.
2. To replace a record for a fish weighing 11.33 kg. (25 lb.) or more, the replacement must weigh at least one half of one percent more than the existing record. For an existing record weighing 45.35 kg. (100 lb.), the additional weight required to defeat the record would be 226.7 grams (8 ounces).
3. A catch that matches the weight of an existing record or exceeds the weight by less than the amount required to defeat the record will be considered a tie. In the case of a tie claim involving more than two catches, the weight must be compared with the original record (i.e., the first fish caught). No catch weighing less than the original record will be considered. In the event of an angler tying an existing record they currently hold; the catch must weigh at least 28.35 grams (1 ounce) greater than their current record to qualify for a tie.
4. The weight of the sling, platform or rope (if one is used to secure the fish on the scales) must be determined and deducted from the total weight.
5. No estimated weights will be accepted. With the exception of Junior and Smallfry records, fish must be weighed on land.
6. Only weights indicated by the graduations on the scale will be accepted. Visual fractionalizing of these graduations is not allowed. Any weights that fall between two graduations on the scale must be rounded to the lower of the two.
7. NZSFC/IGFA reserves the right to require any scale to be recertified for accuracy if there are any indications that the scale might not have weighed correctly.
8. All fish must be weighed by the person/s nominated by the club as the weighmaster of the club or on scales for which a current certification of accuracy is available.
9. NZSFC Clubs should set their own rules to cover the trucking of fish to weigh stations within their own recognised waters.

Time Limits on Claims

With the exception of AllTackle World Records, claims for record fish caught in U.S. continental waters must be received by IGFA within 60 days of the date of catch. Claims for record fish caught in other waters must be received by IGFA within 90 days of the date of catch.

Weighing Requirements

1. All fish submitted for record consideration must be weighed on scales that have

been certified for accuracy by government agencies or other qualified and accredited organizations within the past 12 months. Disinterested witnesses to the weight should be used whenever possible. If at the time of weighing the fish the scale has not been properly certified within the past twelve months, it must be checked and certified for accuracy as quickly as possible, and an official report stating the findings of the inspection prior to any adjustment of the scale must be included with the record application. **A copy of the test certificate must be forwarded to the Secretary of the NZSFC before January 1 of each season.**

2. The weight of the sling, platform or rope (if one is used to secure the fish on the scales) must be determined and deducted from the total weight.
3. No estimated weights will be accepted. With the exception of Junior and Smallfry records, fish must be weighed on land.
4. Only weights indicated by the graduations on the scale will be accepted. Visual fractionalizing of these graduations is not allowed. Any weights that fall between two graduations on the scale must be rounded to the lower of the two.
5. NZSFC/IGFA reserves the right to require any scale to be recertified for accuracy if there are any indications that the scale might not have weighed correctly.
6. All fish must be weighed by the person/s nominated by the club as the weighmaster of the club or on scales for which a current certification of accuracy is available.
7. NZSFC Clubs should set their own rules to cover the trucking of fish to weigh stations within their own recognised waters.

Note: IGFA offers a scale certification service for IGFA members at a fee of \$40 USD.

Preparation of Claims

To apply for a world record, the angler must submit a complete IGFA application form, the mandatory length of line and terminal tackle (described below) used to catch the fish, and acceptable photographs of the fish, the rod and reel used to catch the fish, the scale used to weigh the fish, and the angler with the fish.

Application Form

A current, official IGFA world record application form must be used for record claims. This form may be found on the www.igfa.org website or in the World Record Game Fishes book. No other version of the application form will be accepted.

When making any record claim, the angler must indicate the specified strength of the line or tippet used to catch the fish. In the cases of Line Class and Tippet Class records, this will place the claim in an IGFA Line or Tippet Class category (see Line Class and Tippet Class categories). All lines and tippets will be examined by IGFA to verify the specified strength of the line. If the line or tippet over tests its class, the application will be considered in the next highest class. If the line or tippet under tests into a lower Line or Tippet Class, the application will not be considered for the lower Line Class or Tippet Class. The heaviest Line Class permitted for both freshwater and saltwater records is 60 kg. (130 lb.). The heaviest Tippet Class permitted for Tippet Class records is 10 kg. (20 lb.). If the line or tippet over tests these maximum strengths, the claim will be denied.

Extreme care should be exercised in measuring the fish, as the measurements are often important for weight verification and scientific studies. See the measurement diagram on the record application to be sure the fish is measured correctly.

The angler is responsible for obtaining the necessary signatures and correct addresses of the boat captain (where applicable), weighmaster (where applicable) and witnesses on the application. If an IGFA officer or representative, or an officer or member of an IGFA club is available, he or she should be asked to witness the claim. The angler must appear in person before a qualified authority to have an application notarized. In locations where notarization is not possible or customary, the signature of a government official, a member of an embassy, legation or consular staff or an IGFA officer or representative may replace notarization. Applications delivered to the IGFA Headquarters in person do not require notarization.

Any deliberate falsification of an application will disqualify the applicant for any future IGFA World Record and any existing records will be nullified.

Line or Tippet Sample

All applications caught on fly fishing tackle must be accompanied by the fly, the entire tippet and the entire leader connected in one piece.

All applications caught on conventional tackle must be accompanied by the entire leader (including the hook or hooks), the double line and at least 5 meters (16.5 feet) closest to the double line, leader or hook. All line samples and the leader (if one is used) are to be submitted in one piece. Broken or incomplete line samples must be accompanied by a full explanation. The IGFA reserves the right to reject applications with broken line samples that prevent it from testing the breaking strength and/or verifying the length of the double line and leader. If a lure is used with the leader, the leader should be cut at the eye attachment to the lure. Each line sample must be submitted in a manner that it can be easily unwound without damage to the line. A recommended method is to take a rectangular piece of stiff cardboard and cut notches in two opposite ends. Secure one end of the line to the cardboard and wind the line around the cardboard through the notched areas. Secure the other end, and write your name and the specified strength of the line on the cardboard. Any line sample submitted that is tangled or cannot be easily unwound will not be accepted.

Photographic Requirements

Photographs showing the full length of the fish, the rod and reel used to make the catch, and the scale used to weigh the fish must accompany each record application. A photograph of the angler with the fish is also required.

For species identification, the clearest possible photos should be submitted. This is especially important in the cases of hybrids and fishes that may be confused with similar species. Shark applications should include a photograph of the shark's teeth and of the head and back taken from above in addition to the photographs taken from the side. Whether the shark has or does not have a ridge between the dorsal fins

should be clearly evident in this photograph for identification purposes.

For best results, photograph the fish broadside to the camera so that no part of the fish is obscured. The fins should be fully extended and not obscured with the hands in cases where the number of spines and rays need to be counted. When photographing a fish lying on its side, the surface beneath the fish should be smooth and a ruler or marked tape placed beside the fish if possible. Photographs from various angles are most helpful. An additional photograph of the fish on the scale with actual weight visible is also helpful.

It is important that we have clear, publishable photographs of the fish and the angler, including action shots, if available. Original, high resolution digital files are preferred and will assist the IGFA in publicizing the world record catch. The IGFA encourages anglers to release record fish whenever possible and we prefer to see photos of fish carefully being held horizontally, and not vertically, to prevent harming the fish.

Formulas for Weights & Measures

Persons submitting world record claims are required to provide the weights and measurements of the fish in the units in which they were taken. The following formulas are provided for your information.

NZSFC/IGFA Flyfishing Rules

Equipment Regulations

A. Line

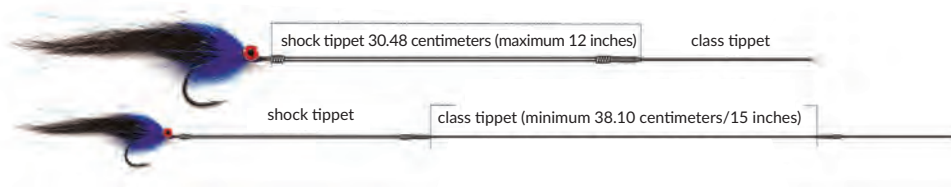
Any type of fly line and backing may be used. The breaking strength of the fly line and backing are not restricted.

B. Leader

Leaders must conform to generally accepted fly fishing customs. A leader includes a class tippet and, optionally, a shock tippet. A butt or taper section between the fly line and the class tippet shall also be considered part of the leader and there are no limits on its length, material, or strength. A class tippet must be made of nonmetallic material and either attached directly to the fly or to the shock tippet if one is used.

The class tippet must be at least 38.10 centimeters (15 inches) long (measured inside connecting knots). With respect to knotless, tapered leaders, the terminal 38.10 centimeters (15 inches) will also determine tippet class. There is no maximum length limitation. A shock tippet, not to exceed 30.48 centimeters (12 inches) in length, may be added to the class tippet and tied to the fly. It can be made of any type of material, and there is no limit on its breaking strength. The shock tippet is measured from the eye of the hook to the single strand of class tippet and includes any knots used to connect the shock tippet to the class tippet. In the case of a tandem hook fly, the shock tippet shall be measured from the eye of the leading hook.

Shock tippet is not to exceed 30.48 centimeters (12 inches) in length measured from the eye of the hook to the single strand of class tippet and includes any knots used to connect the shock tippet to the tippet.



The class tippet must be at least 38.10 centimeters (15 inches) long (measured inside connecting knots). With respect to knotless, tapered leaders, the terminal 38.10 centimeters (15 inches) will also determine tippet.

C. Rod

Regardless of material used or number of sections, rods must conform and cast according to generally accepted fly fishing customs and practices. A rod shall not measure less than 1.82 meters (6 feet) in overall length and any rod that gives the angler an unsporting advantage will be disqualified. Overall butt length (including any extensions) may not exceed 15.24 centimeters (6 inches) when measured from the center of the reel foot to the end of the butt. Overall butt length for two handed or spey rods longer than 3.35 meters (11 feet) may not exceed 25.4 centimeters (10 inches) when measured from the center of the reel foot to the end of the butt.

D. Reel

The reel must be designed expressly for fly fishing. There are no restrictions on gear ratio or type of drag employed except where the angler would gain an unfair advantage. Electric or electronically operated reels are prohibited.

E. Hooks

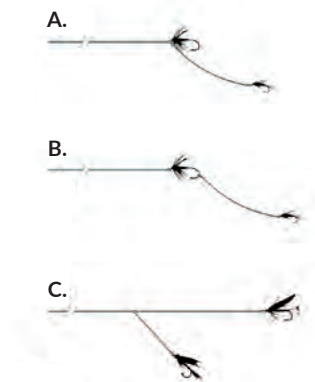
A conventional fly may be dressed on a single or double hook or two single hooks in tandem. The second hook in any tandem fly must not extend beyond the wing material. The eyes of the hooks shall be no farther than 15.24 centimeters (6 inches) apart. Treble hooks are prohibited.

F. Flies

The fly must be a recognized type of artificial fly, which includes streamer, bucktail, tube fly, wet fly, dry fly, nymph, popper and bug. The use of any other type of lure or natural or preserved bait, either singularly or attached to the fly, is expressly prohibited. The fact that a fly can be cast with a fly rod is not evidence in itself that it fits the definition of a fly. The use of any fly designed to entangle or foul hook a fish is prohibited. No scent, either natural or artificial is allowed on flies. The use of scented material in a fly is prohibited. Only a single fly is allowed with the exception of dropper flies that may be used only in the circumstances described below.

Dropper flies are permissible only for fishing for Salmonid species (e.g., trout, grayling, salmon, etc.) under the following configuration:

1. Dropper flies may consist of no more than two flies fished in tandem that are surface flies, subsurface flies or a combination of the two.
2. The material connecting the two flies must be equal to or less than the breaking strength of the class tippet material connecting the lead fly to the fly leader.
3. Catches will be categorized by the breaking strength of the class tippet preceding the lead fly, no matter which fly the fish is caught on.



G. Gaffs and Nets

Gaffs, tail snares and nets used to boat or land a fish must not exceed 2.44 meters (8 feet) in overall length. In the case of tail snares, overall length is defined as the distance from the beginning of the handle to the apex of the snare when loaded. This limitation does not apply when fishing from a bridge, pier or other high stationary structure. The use of a flying gaff is not permitted. Only a single hook is permitted on any gaff. Harpoons or lances are prohibited. A rope or any extension cannot be attached to the gaff.

Angling Regulations

1. The angler must cast, hook, fight, and bring the fish to gaff or net unaided by any other person. No other person may touch any part of the tackle during the playing of the fish or give aid other than taking the leader for gaffing or netting purposes. Anyone assisting a shorebound or wading angler must be within a rods length of the angler before touching the leader or netting or gaffing the fish.
2. Casting and retrieving must be carried out in accordance with normal customs and generally accepted practices. The major criterion in casting is that the weight of the line must carry the fly rather than the weight of the fly carrying the line. Trolling a fly behind a moving water craft is not permitted. The craft must be completely out of gear both at the time the fly is presented to the fish and during the retrieve. The maximum amount of line that can be

stripped off the reel is 36.75 meters (120 feet) from the fly.

3. Once a fish is hooked, the tackle may not be altered in any way, with the exception of adding an extension butt. A harness cannot be attached to the fly rod.
4. Fish must be hooked on the fly in use. If a small fish takes the fly and a larger fish swallows the smaller fish, the catch will be disallowed.
5. One or more people may assist in gaffing or netting the fish.
6. The angling and equipment regulations shall apply until the fish is weighed.

The following acts will disqualify a catch:

1. Failure to comply with equipment or angling regulations.
2. The act of persons other than the angler in touching any part of the rod, reel, or line either bodily or with any device during the playing of the fish, or in giving any aid other than that allowed in the rules and regulations. If an obstacle to the passage of the line through the rod guides has to be removed from the line, then the obstacle shall be held and cut free. Under no circumstances should the line be held or touched by anyone other than the angler during this process.
3. Resting the rod on any part of the boat, or on any other object while playing the fish.
4. Handlining or using a handline or rope attached in any manner to the angler's line or leader for the purpose of holding or lifting the fish.
5. Intentionally foul hooking or snagging a fish.
6. Shooting, harpooning, or lancing any fish (including sharks and halibut) at any stage of the catch.
7. Chumming with the flesh, blood, skin, or any part of mammals.
8. Using a boat or device to beach or drive a fish into shallow water in order to deprive the fish of its normal ability to swim.
9. Attaching the angler's line or leader to part of a boat or other object for the purpose of holding or lifting the fish.

10. If a fish escapes before gaffing or netting and is recaptured by any method other than as outlined in the angling rules.
11. When a rod breaks (while the fish is being played) in a manner that reduces its length below minimum dimensions or severely impairs its angling characteristics.
12. When a fish is hooked or entangled on more than one line.
13. Mutilation to the fish, prior to landing or boating the catch, caused by sharks, other fish, mammals, or propellers that remove or penetrate the flesh. Injuries caused by leader or line, scratches, old healed scars or regeneration deformities are not considered to be disqualifying injuries. Any mutilation on the fish must be shown in a photograph and fully explained in a report accompanying the record application.
14. Holding or touching an angler in a manner that assists them in fighting the fish or takes pressure off of the angler. Touching or briefly holding the angler to prevent them from falling does not constitute a disqualification.
2. Nets used to boat or land a fish must not exceed 2.44 meters (8 feet) in overall length. When fishing from a bridge, pier or other high stationary structure, this length limitation does not apply.
3. The use of knotless, rubber coated nets or other similarly designed nets that minimize slime and scale removal is strongly recommended.

B. Measuring device

1. All fish must be measured using the official IGFA measuring device.
2. The measuring device mat may be shortened by cutting it, but it may not be rejoined after it has been shortened.

Angling Regulations

The following acts will disqualify a catch:

1. Failure to comply with IGFA equipment or angling rules.
2. If the fish dies during the documentation process, or does not swim away on its accord after release.

Length Record Requirements

All fish entered for All-Tackle Length World Records are subject to the same requirements stipulated for other record categories with the following additions and exceptions. Species eligible for All-Tackle Length World Records may be found in the World Record Game Fishes book or online at www.igfa.org.

A. Measuring requirements

1. Fish must be measured using the official IGFA measuring device on a flat surface.
2. The fish's snout must be touching the nose stop and free of lures or lifting devices.
3. With the fish lying on top of the measuring device, measurements must be taken from the most forward part of the fish's snout to the rear center edge of the tail.
4. All measurements must be made in centimeters.
5. Fish that measure between centimeter increments shall be recorded at the lower of the two increments. For example, a fish that measures between 45 and 46 centimeters will have a recorded length of 45 centimeters.

All-Tackle Length Category Rules

Catch-and-Release Only

General Information

All fish entered for All-Tackle Length World Records must be measured by anglers at the site of capture and released so that they swim away on their own and in good condition. Fish should be revived by moving them forward in the water to ensure a healthy release. Fish caught and entered for length records are not eligible for weighing and submission for other record categories.

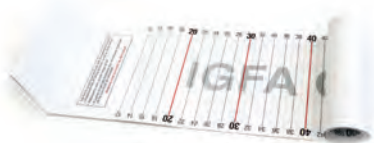
Rules and Equipment Regulations

All IGFA rules and equipment regulations stipulated for fishing with conventional and fly tackle in fresh and saltwater shall apply with the exceptions below. All angling and equipment regulations shall apply until the fish is measured and released alive.

A. Gaffs and nets

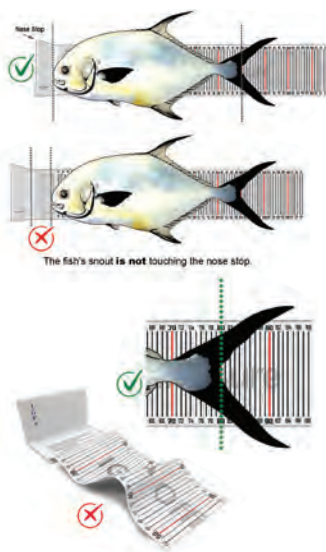
1. The use of gaffs to land fish is prohibited.

Using your measuring device

- With the fish lying on top of the measuring device, measurements must be taken from the most forward part of the fish's snout to the rear centre edge of the tail.
- The fish's snout must be touching the nose stop and be free of hands, flies or lifting devices.
- All measurements must be made in centimeters. Fish measuring between centimeter increments shall be recorded at the lower of the two increments. For example, a fish that measures between 79 and 80 centimeters will have a recorded length of 79 centimeters.
- The fish must be measured using the official IGFA measuring device on a flat surface. There must be no wrinkles or overlaps in the device when measuring the permit.



NZSFC recommends that where a fish entirely covers the first portion of the measure mat fully obscuring the measure ruler numbers, then the fish should be photographed with the nose towards the upper or lower section of the stop to reveal measurement in full

B. Minimum length requirements for vacant records

Fish entered for vacant record categories must measure within the top half of that species maximum recorded length.

C. Minimum length requirements needed to defeat or tie existing records

1. To defeat an existing record, the fish must measure at least two (2) centimeters longer than the existing record.
2. A catch that matches the length of an existing record or exceeds the length by less than two centimeters will be considered a tie. In the case of a tie claim involving more than two catches, length must be compared with the original record (first fish to be caught). Nothing measuring less than the original record will be considered. In the event of an angler tying an existing record they currently hold; the catch must measure at least one centimeter greater than their current record to qualify for a tie.

D. Photographic requirements

Photographs included with applications must contain the following:

1. The full length of the fish on the measuring device clearly showing the position of the mouth and tail. The fish may be held in position, but must be done in a manner that does not obscure the view of the fish on the tape.
2. A close up showing the position of the fish's nose and tail on the measuring device.
3. The angler with the fish.
4. The rod and reel used to make the catch.

General Best Handling Practices

To remove your fish from the water to document it for record purposes, anglers should use either hands or a knotless, rubberized landing net to minimize slime and scale loss. Lip gripping devices may be used to help subdue fish.

However, large fish should not be hoisted vertically out of the water, as this can cause damage to jaw muscle and bone as well as to internal organs. The best method for removing fish from the water by hand is to grip the fish or the lower jaw and support the fish's underside. Again, the point is always to hold fish horizontally and not vertically.

Documentation

IGFA World Records require pictures and measurement and/or weighing of the catch. All of this takes time, so you should have the necessary equipment ready before landing the fish. If the documentation process takes longer than a minute, periodically place the fish back in the water or place in a live well to allow it to breathe.

Releasing

Considerable care should be exercised when releasing fish. Fish should be placed in the water and held by the base of the tail. If the fish does not swim away from your grasp on its own, gently move it forward in the water to get water flowing over the gills. For best results, move the fish in the forward direction only instead of back and forth. Moving the fish in a slow circle or gently towing it.

SECTION 3: NZSFC REGULATIONS

These NZSFC regulations are provided to address New Zealand specific practices.

3.1 Sport NZ (formerly SPARC)

Appeals can be taken to the Sports Tribunal in respect of disciplinary matters or breaches of NZSFC fishing rules and regulations. Any appeals must be submitted within 28 days

3.2 NZSFC fishing waters

To be eligible for NZSFC Awards/Trophies or New Zealand Records fish must be caught in the waters within 200 miles of the coasts of the two main islands of New Zealand including the Chatham Islands

3.3 Catch summary sheets:

These must be completed and sent to the Council Secretary on a regular basis. They should include all fish weighed by the Club and all Tag Cards handled by the Club.

3.4 IGFA & NZSFC rules

a) When clubs are conducting their own

tournaments – and visiting clubs are involved, they must make their own rules of entry.

- b) When members of unincorporated clubs are entering the Nationals and fishing for Council trophies they must prove they are a separate club in their own right and not part of another club.
- c) Clubs may conduct fishing tournaments for sustenance reasons without complying with NZSFC fishing rules and regulations (Section 7.5 of the constitution refers). Fish caught for these reasons will not qualify for any present Council awards or prizes.

3.5 Courtesy weighing:

- a) All clubs are required to courtesy weigh fish (at no charge) for anglers of affiliated clubs within the recognised hours of the weigh stations operation of the club. A fee may only be charged to non-affiliated fishers requesting a courtesy weigh. Clubs intending to charge for courtesy weighs for non-affiliates must advise Council of their intention and the fee to be charged at the beginning of the season.
- b) Anglers requiring a courtesy weigh or courtesy Tag & Release must present two completed weigh sheets /catch cards to the weighmaster (either on sheets / cards from the club providing the courtesy weigh, or their own club's sheets / cards prior to the fish being weighed. For Tag& Release, the weighmaster shall sight and check the completed Tag Card. The weighmaster shall retain / forward the Tag.

All club weigh sheets/catch cards shall have three additional tick boxes easily distinguishable near the particular Club's heading.

- i. Courtesy Weigh – non-member
- ii. Copy
- iii. Courtesy Weigh – NZSFC Affiliated Member.

There shall be a line beside this box (suitably headed) to record the fishers Club and Membership No.

- c) When a fish is courtesy weighed the fish will be accredited for statistical purposes to the angler's club.

- i. An inland club can negotiate with a coastal club to use their facilities as a satellite weigh station. This must be notified to the NZSFC Secretary. The tally goes to the inland club and the coastal club must be aware they can't count them in their own tally as well.
 - d) The recognition of the angler weighing this fish is at the discretion of the anglers club.
 - e) Courtesy weighs must be used where practical to ensure fish are recorded to the weigh stations within the area of catch.
- b) All club, NZ or world record claims will be recognised regardless of marlin weight if ratified.
 - c) The NZSFC is to seek and provide regular information to clubs on tagging of marlin. This should include recommended techniques and equipment to enhance the initial placement of tags, the recovery of the fish and ultimately improved recapture rates of tagged marlin.

3.6 Permanent weigh stations:

As included with Club information in the NZSFC Yearbook.

3.7 Catch flags:

Catch flags are a symbolic and optional gesture to communicate a boat's catch.

ALBACORE – White Flag with Red Fish

BROADBILL – Yellow flag with Black fish

MARLIN – Blue Flag with White Fish

TUNA – White Flag with Blue Fish

SHARK – Red flag with Black fish

YELLOWTAIL KINGFISH – White Flag with Green Fish

WAHOO – White Flag Orange Fish

OTHER SPECIES – Yellow Flag

TAGGED FISH – Red with White T

Generally these flags measure 70 cm x 35 cm

Individual Club's should make their own arrangements with regard to the flying of flags whilst playing a fish.

3.8 MARLIN

- a) It is recommended for all clubs affiliated to the NZSFC that the minimum weight for marlin is 90kg. The minimum weight should apply for award or contest purposes and is recommended as a guide to encourage tagging of marlin, with the exception of b) below.

It should not discourage any marlin landed being weighed even if it is assessed as being under the recommended 90 kg weight. All marlin presented to a club for weighing should be recorded and details

forwarded to the NZSFC for statistical recording purposes.

- b) All club, NZ or world record claims will be recognised regardless of marlin weight if ratified.
- c) The NZSFC is to seek and provide regular information to clubs on tagging of marlin. This should include recommended techniques and equipment to enhance the initial placement of tags, the recovery of the fish and ultimately improved recapture rates of tagged marlin.

3.9 Sharks

White Sharks are now protected in New Zealand so the records we have are 'historical' only. No Awards will be given.

3.10 Tagging Programme

Species in the tagging programme:

- Broadbill
- All marlin species (excluding spearfish)
- Blue and Mako sharks
- Yellowtail Kingfish - Kingfish in particular should be measured before letting them go
- Tuna

SECTION 4: AWARDS AND TROPHIES

4.1 Requirements for trophies & awards

To qualify for NZSFC Trophies:-

1. Fish must be caught in NZSFC waters
2. All NZSFC fishing rules and angling regulations must be complied with at the time of the catch
3. All anglers must be financial members of Clubs affiliated to the NZSFC at the time of capture. For the Photo competition the photographer must be a financial member of a Club affiliated to the NZSFC. Photos become the property of the NZSFC and can be used in whatever publications they so choose.
4. With the exception of the first marlin of the season trophies, nominations must be received by the Secretary no later than July 7 each year. With regard to the First Marlin these nominations must be notified to the Council Secretary by emailing the weigh sheet within 24 hours of the fish being weighed or tagged.
5. For each Annual Trophy, NZSFC will present a suitable miniature which will NOT include Council plaques.
6. Judging of the Old Man and the Sea Cup will be by such persons as the Board decide
7. Weighed marlin must exceed 90 kg
8. Nominations for trophies and awards must come from Clubs
9. A Club may put in more than one nomination

4.2 Recommendation to clubs for record pin awards:

(NB This recommendation is for those Clubs who award Pins)

For a New Zealand Record =

a Silver Pin with a Ruby coloured Eye

For a World Record =

a Gold Pin with a Ruby coloured Eye

Clubs to make their own arrangements regarding purchase and distribution of these pins at their own cost.

4.3 Grand Slam Clubs:

The NZSFC has introduced grand slam clubs for its anglers fishing in New Zealand. They are unique to New Zealand and serve as a supreme award for a lifetime of angling. To qualify for a slam club an angler must catch one of each type specified for each of the awards and meet the minimum weight requirements for each fish. All fish to be eligible to qualify towards your grand slam must be caught in accordance with angling rules for IGFA and NZSFC. You must have proof of capture (certificate, club yearbook, or photo of your fish with weigh board information included). All claims must be endorsed and verified by your club secretary. Your club must have been affiliated at the time of capture. These are lifetime awards and retrospective captures count provided the requirements are met.

- Proof will be by an official catch card recognized by the NZSFC, by verification from a club year book or magazine. The club must have been affiliated to the NZSFC at the time of capture.
- IGFA & NZSFC rules are to be observed.
- A plaque or certificate will be issued if the slam is awarded.
- The recipient is to be honoured in the Council's annual yearbook.

GUIDE TO EQUIPMENT REGULATIONS

DOUBLE LINES AND LEADERS



Double lines are measured from the start of the knot, braid, roll or splice making the double line to the farthestmost end of the knot, splice, snap, swivel or other device used for securing the trace, leader lure or hook to the double line. A double line must consist of the actual line used to catch the fish. For saltwater species, the double line shall be limited to 4.57 meters (15 feet) for all line classes up to and including 10 kg. (20 lb.); and shall be limited to 9.14 meters (30 feet) for line classes over 10 kg. (20 lb.). For freshwater species, the double line on all classes of tackle shall not exceed 1.82 meters (6 feet).



The leader shall be limited to 4.57 meters (15 feet) for saltwater species in line classes up to and including 10 kg. (20 lb.), and 9.14 meters (30 feet) for all line classes over 10 kg. (20 lb.). For freshwater species, the leader on all classes of tackle shall be limited to 1.82 meters (6 feet).



The length of the leader is the overall length including any lure, hook arrangements or other device.



The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 6.1 meters (20 feet) in line classes up to and including 10 kg. (20 lb.) and 12.19 meters (40 feet) in line classes over 10 kg. (20 lb.) for saltwater species. The combined length of the double line and leader shall not exceed 3.04 meters (10 feet) for freshwater species.

NATURAL BAITS AND ARTIFICIAL



LEGAL if eyes of hooks no more than 45.72 centimeters (18 inches) apart in baits and no more than 30.45 centimeters (12 inches) apart in lures. **NOT LEGAL** if eyes further apart than these distances.



NOT LEGAL as the second or trailing hook extends more than the hooks length beyond skirt. See also two hook rigs.



NOT LEGAL in bait or lures as eyes of hooks are less than a hooks length (the length of the largest hook) apart.



LEGAL as eyes of hooks are no less than a hooks length apart and no more than 45.72 centimeters (18 inches) in baits and 30.45 centimeters (12 inches) in lures.



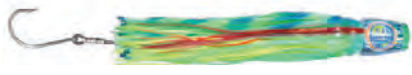
LEGAL in baits and lures. The point of one hook is passed through the eye of the other hook.



LEGAL as eyes of hooks are no less than a hooks length apart and no more than 30.45 centimeters (12 inches) apart, and the trailing hook does not extend more than a hooks length beyond the skirt.



LEGAL as hook is contained within the skirt.



NOT LEGAL as the single hook extends more than its length beyond the skirt.



NOT LEGAL as back hook is not firmly imbedded in or securely attached to bait and is dangling or swinging hook.



LEGAL as both hooks are firmly imbedded or securely attached to bait. Would not be legal if eyes of hooks were more than 45.72 centimeters (18 inches) apart.

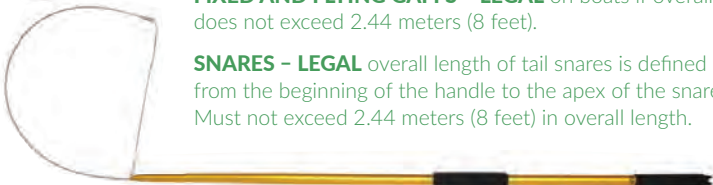
GAFFS AND SNARES



FLYING GAFFS - LEGAL on boats if effective rope length does not exceed 9.14 meters (30 feet).



FIXED AND FLYING GAFFS - LEGAL on boats if overall gaff length does not exceed 2.44 meters (8 feet).



SNARES - LEGAL overall length of tail snares is defined as the distance from the beginning of the handle to the apex of the snare when loaded. Must not exceed 2.44 meters (8 feet) in overall length.

ASSIST HOOKS

Assist hooks or other such single hooks that are attached to a lure with a lead constructed of monofilament, multifilament, wire or other such material must conform to the following: When using assist hooks on any artificial lure, other than a skirted lure, the lead cannot be more than 1 ½ hook's length and the bend of the hook may not be more than 101 millimeters (4 inches), whichever is less, from the closest point of attachment on the lure. A maximum of three assist hooks can be used. Double and treble hooks may not be used as assist hooks.



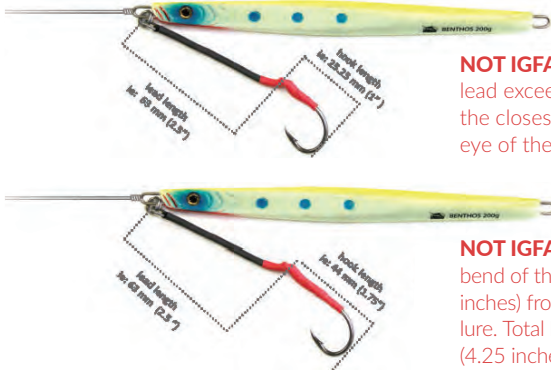
IGFA COMPLIANT With this assist hook, the lead is within 1 1/2 hooks length (measured from the closest point of attachment on the lure to the eye of the hook).

IGFA COMPLIANT Multiple assist hooks are allowed. Double and treble hooks may not be used as assist hooks.

Assist hook (or hooks) can be attached to either end of the lure.

ARTIFICIAL LURES Assist hooks can be used with any artificial lure, other than a skirted lure.

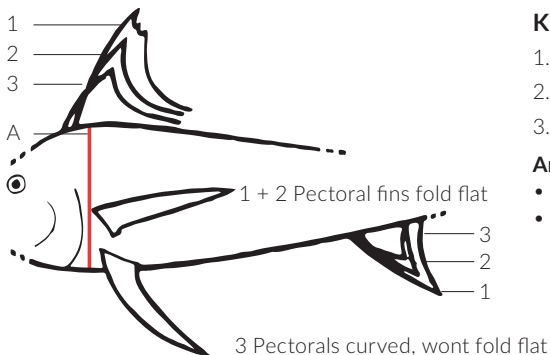

QUICK CHECKLIST FOR APPLICATIONS

The following checklist was designed to assist anglers in the record submittal process. Before submitting a record application, anglers are encouraged to read the NZSFC and IGFA International Angling Rules for a complete list of world record requirements and regulations.

PHOTO DOCUMENTATION

The following photos are required for all NZSFC/IGFA record submissions:

- Angler with the fish
 - Rod and reel used to weigh fish
 - Fish being measured on the IGFA's Official Measuring Device (All-Tackle Length records only)
 - Additional photos of fish that may pose some difficulty to identify (fins, teeth etc)
- *Videos can be used in place of photographs.

SCALES

All potential world records to be weighed on a scale that has been certified within the past year.

TACKLE

The following items are required for all record submissions:

CONVENTIONAL TACKLE

- Full length of leader/trace including hooks, lures etc (if used)
- Full length of double line including knots, swivels, clips, etc (if used)
- Sample of main line (~15 metres/50 feet) immediately following the leader, double line, or hook/lure
- Sample(s) of backing (~15 metres/50 feet) (if used).

FLY TACKLE

- The full length of fly leader, including:
- Shock tippet (including fly)
- Class tippet.

APPLICATION

- Every applicable section of the record application must be completed
- Contact information for witnesses to the catch and the weighing are required
- Every application must be signed by the angler/guardian in the presence of a notary or acceptable substitute.

WEIGH STATION RESPONSIBILITIES

ANGLERS, CREWS, BOAT OWNERS & CHARTER BOAT CAPTAIN'S

1. Every angler, crew, boat owner and charter boat captain must make themselves totally familiar with the fishing rules and regulations set down by IGFA, NZSFC and individual clubs and their tournaments.
2. The weighperson is in charge of the weighstation. Anglers, crew, boat owners and charter boat captains are required to work in with the weighperson with the handling and the presentation for the weighing of fish.
3. The angler must complete the weigh sheet other than the weight before presenting the fish to the weighperson.
4. If a fish has any new wounds other than the clean gaffing wound or wounds such as may be inflicted by a propeller or another predator this will disqualify the fish. If this fish is weighed in a mutilated condition it will not qualify for any IGFA, NZSFC, Club or tournament trophies or prizes.
5. Parties are requested to co-operate with the weighperson to check any relevant equipment related to this catch.
6. The angler or their representative must be on hand to make sure the scales are zeroed before weighing the fish. Also the angler or representative must be present to verify the weight of the fish when the weighperson has the final weight.
7. Parties are requested not to get into any consultation over any disagreement that may occur at the weighstation with the weighperson.

Any disagreements should be taken to the appropriate person in charge of fishing regulations within the club for them to adjudicate over.

When the weighperson is the weighmaster and judge they will then adjudicate on the IGFA and NZSFC fishing rules and regulations, along with any club and tournament rules that may apply.
8. Anglers are requested when courtesy

weighing to adhere to the individual clubs requirements, procedures and weighing times which may vary from club to club. Anglers must produce their club membership card or proof of membership before the fish can be courtesy weighed. There may be a courtesy weigh fee required by the club performing the courtesy weigh. Visiting anglers who are non members will be charged a fee before weighing the fish.

There should be two weigh sheets filled in for courtesy weighs, one for the club doing the courtesy weigh and one for the angler to take back to their own club. This is the angler's responsibility.

9. Parties are requested to make themselves familiar with the weighing hours of the club and the procedure required to weigh fish outside of these times.
10. When parties wish to have the tag and release of a fish identified at the weigh station they must adhere to the protocol of the individual club.
11. Weighing of fish can be a joyous occasion with a little celebration going on before you get to the weigh station. Parties must appreciate that weighpersons have a big responsibility and not let their exuberance interfere with the serious procedure of weighing of the fish and the possible checking of the equipment and the fish.
12. The only weight that is recognised is the first weight of the fish on a recognised weigh station. Any other weight that may be established will not be recognised.
13. Tag cards must be checked when handed in.

The minimum information required is date, location, species and estimation of size. Other information on the state of the fish's well-being is desirable.
14. Anglers and crew should co-operate with the Marine Biologists, Scientists and other Government Officials or Organisations in charge of science and research.

WEIGHPERSON'S RESPONSIBILITIES

1. The weighstations are the front door of every club. Their procedure and presentation reflect on their club as a whole.
2. All weighing scales must have a current certification 12 months of the year. There is no given time when there may be a requirement to weigh a world or National record.
3. All weighpersons must make themselves familiar with the operation of the scales they are using. Makes and brands of scales can and do vary from club to club.
4. A club must fish under NZSFC and IGFA rules, and regulations as well as their club rules. Weighpersons must make themselves familiar with these rules especially the tackle and species. They will be checking the leaders and the double line and making sure of the line weight and gaffs set down in the IGFA rules as well as species.
5. Weighpersons must check for any new wounds in the fish such as propeller or predator inflections etc. Any one of these injuries must be reported to the appropriate person or persons within the club for them to adjudicate over the legality of the catch. The only injury that is acceptable is the clean gaffing wound or wounds.
6. Weighpersons must have proof of NZSFC club membership before a courtesy weigh can be performed. There may be a club fee to pay before courtesy weighing. A non member will be charged a fee before weighing any fish.. Weighpersons must receive from the angler the filled in weigh/catch sheet before weighing the fish, to be completed with the weight and their signature verifying the weight after the fish is weighed by the weighperson.
7. Weighpersons must make sure that the scale is zeroed and witnessed by the angler or their representative before weighing the fish. Also the angler or representative must be present to verify the weight of the fish when the weighperson has the final weight.
8. All fish must be hung by the tail prior to weighing. For consistency all marlin bills (mouths) must be taped before weighing.
9. Fish can be weighed by the tail, in a cradle or on a flat platform. The weight of the cradle or tail rope must be deducted from the total weight, or hung from the scales and then zeroed before weighing commences.
10. When weighing the fish other than on a platform, it must be allowed to totally settle to ascertain the correct weight. If the scales have a motion sensor this must be used.
11. Bait fish that are in the throat or the stomach of the fish are included in the weight of the fish.
12. The only weight that is recognised is the first weight of the fish on a recognised weigh station. Any other weight that may be established will not be recognised.
13. All lures and traces where practicable must be removed before weighing. Lures are not included in the weight.
14. Weighpersons must not get into consultation with the angler or the crew if there is any discrepancy with the fish or fishing equipment. When there is a discrepancy the weighperson should only notify the angler that he or she has to report the problem to the appropriate person or persons in the club for them to adjudicate over.

If the weighperson is the judge as well as weighmaster and has to adjudicate over the IGFA & NZSFC fishing rules and regulations, they must make themselves familiar, not only with the fishing rules and regulations, but the acts that will disqualify a catch, along with the situations that will disqualify a catch. All IGFA and NZSFC fishing rules and regulations are in the IGFA and NZSFC year books.
15. Weighpersons must make themselves familiar with the presentation procedure for the identification of tagged and released fish. This may be different from club to club.

16. Weighpersons must make themselves familiar with the courtesy weighing requirements of their club. Two weigh sheets should be filled in, one for the club weighing the fish and one for the angler to take back to their club. (Council's policy is that all clubs must courtesy weigh for other affiliated clubs when required).
17. Weighpersons must use the IGFA and NZSFC yearbook for species identification for all fish. There are other publications that can be used for the same purposes.
18. All clubs must be a member of IGFA.
19. Each club will notify the NZSFC of their weighpersons each year.
20. Each club should notify its members and the NZSFC of their normal weighing hours and the procedure required to weigh fish outside of these times.
21. Each club should notify its members and neighbouring clubs of their courtesy weighing requirements.
22. If in doubt on any detail seek assistance.

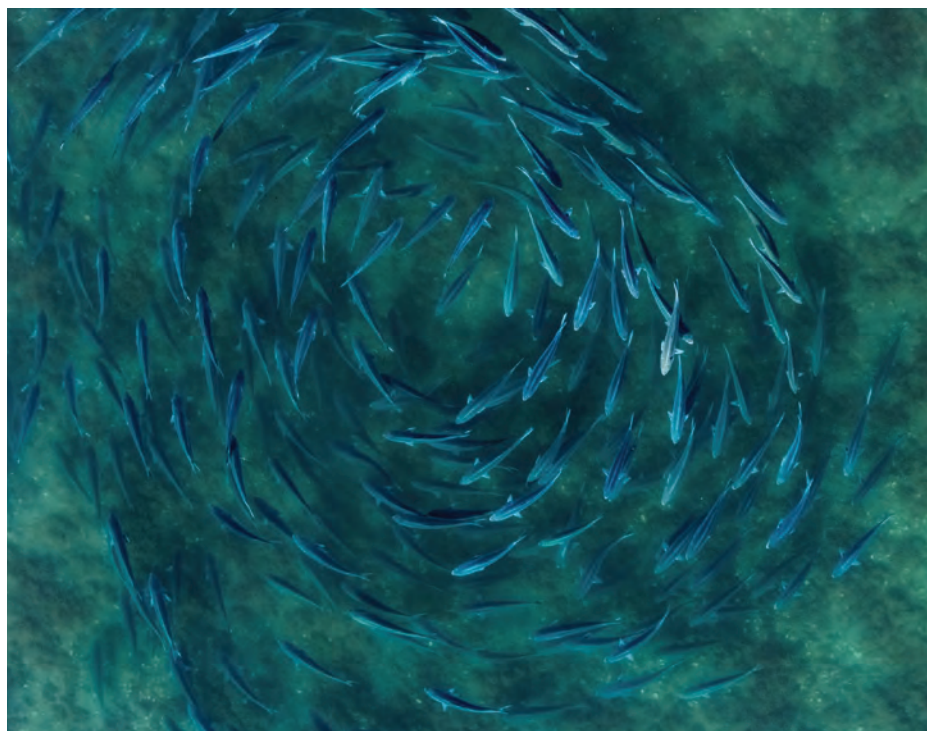
NOTES FOR EVERYONE

Recent wounds on a fish that have occurred while the fish is being angled such as shark bites or propeller wounds or anything else other than clean gaffing automatically disqualifies the fish as a mutilated catch.

If a weighperson has a concern over the line weight he must use the club's line tester to identify the breaking strain. It is in the interest of every club to have their own line tester.

The identified weight of a fish is the first time that it is weighed. No other weight that may be identified will be accepted.

To avoid spoiled (decayed) fish they should be all weighed on the day of their catch. It is up to the individual clubs whether they make this mandatory or not.

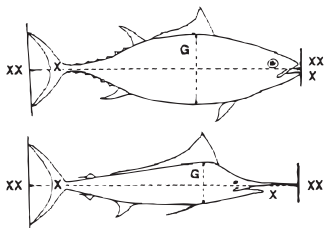

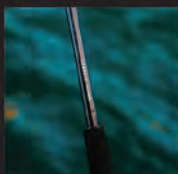
